During the half year when the Great Bear is low in the sky, all earthly bears stay in their dens and keep warm. When the Bear is high in the sky, bears leave their dens, for summer has begun.

Getting acquainted with the stars is a wonderful pastime. How long is it since you have looked for the Milky Way, the Big and Little Dippers, Orion and the Pleiades? Have you looked for the North Star, by which the ancient sailors sailed their ships? There is another star that comes to mind - that wonderful star of song and story, the star of the east - that glorious star of Bethlehem that told of the birth of the Christ Child. The great company of stars bid us gently to pause a moment from our mad dash: to ponder for a moment, the truth that we are part of this great cosmos, and that we were made for it and it for us.
