N. A. Conestoga Wagon Edgeley Pioneer Village

One of the few remaining North American Conestoga wagons will reach Toronto this week en route from Johnstown, Pennsylvania to Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's museum at Edgeley Pioneer Village in Toronto's suburban North York.

The wagon has been obtained by the Authority under its educational program for preservation of historical sites and farm and household items of pioneer life. The museum site at Edgeley already contains interesting buildings and household relics used by pioneers, many of whom came from Pennsylvania.

The Conestoga wagon was the great freight carrier of the 18th century and, first designed in 1725 by settlers along the Conestoga Creek in eastern Pennsylvania, was still in use a hundred years later. During the war of 1812 it was the Conestoga wagons that carried gun-powder to the United States forces around Lake Erie.

Usually painted red white and blue, its 16-foot body, eleven feet high, pulled by six horses, made an imposing 60-foot bell-jingling equipage, carrying as much as eight tons of goods. What the stage coach was to passengers, the Conestogas were to freight. The huge rear wheels were six feet high. The wagon was built high at the ends so that whether light or heavy loaded the goods would always lodge solidly in the middle. Taking finished goods westward, the wagons, sometimes in convoys of a thousand or more, would bring back hides and wheat.

A Safe Christmas and A Happy Christmas
