CHRISTMAS EXTRA CAREFUL

Every year, from a few days before Christmas to the week following new Year's a plague of fires rages up and down the country. Many of these fires result from the extra hazards which exist only during the holiday season and from carelessness that would not be tolerated at any other time.

THE TREE

Place the freshly cut tree trunk in water and check on the water level once a day. Support the tree well. Don't put it near sources of heat (fireplace, radiators, etc.)

LIGHTING

Do not use candles on the tree. Check all lighting sets before using, for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. Be sure the fuse on the electrical circuit is not over 15 amperes.

DECORATIONS AND WRAPPINGS

Don't let Christmas wrappings accumulate in the home; place them in your metal covered trash barrel or burn them in your incinerator as soon as possible.

GIFTS

Don't set up electric trains or spirit-fueled toys under a Christmas tree. Look for the Underwriters' Laboratories label when buying electrical toys.

AND DON'T FORGET

Don't allow smoking near the tree, keep matches, lighters and candles away from tiny hands. Have a bucket of water or your garden hose connected to a faucet, within reach of the tree. If fire should strike, first get everyone out of the house and then call the fire department immediately before attempting to fight the fire yourself.


