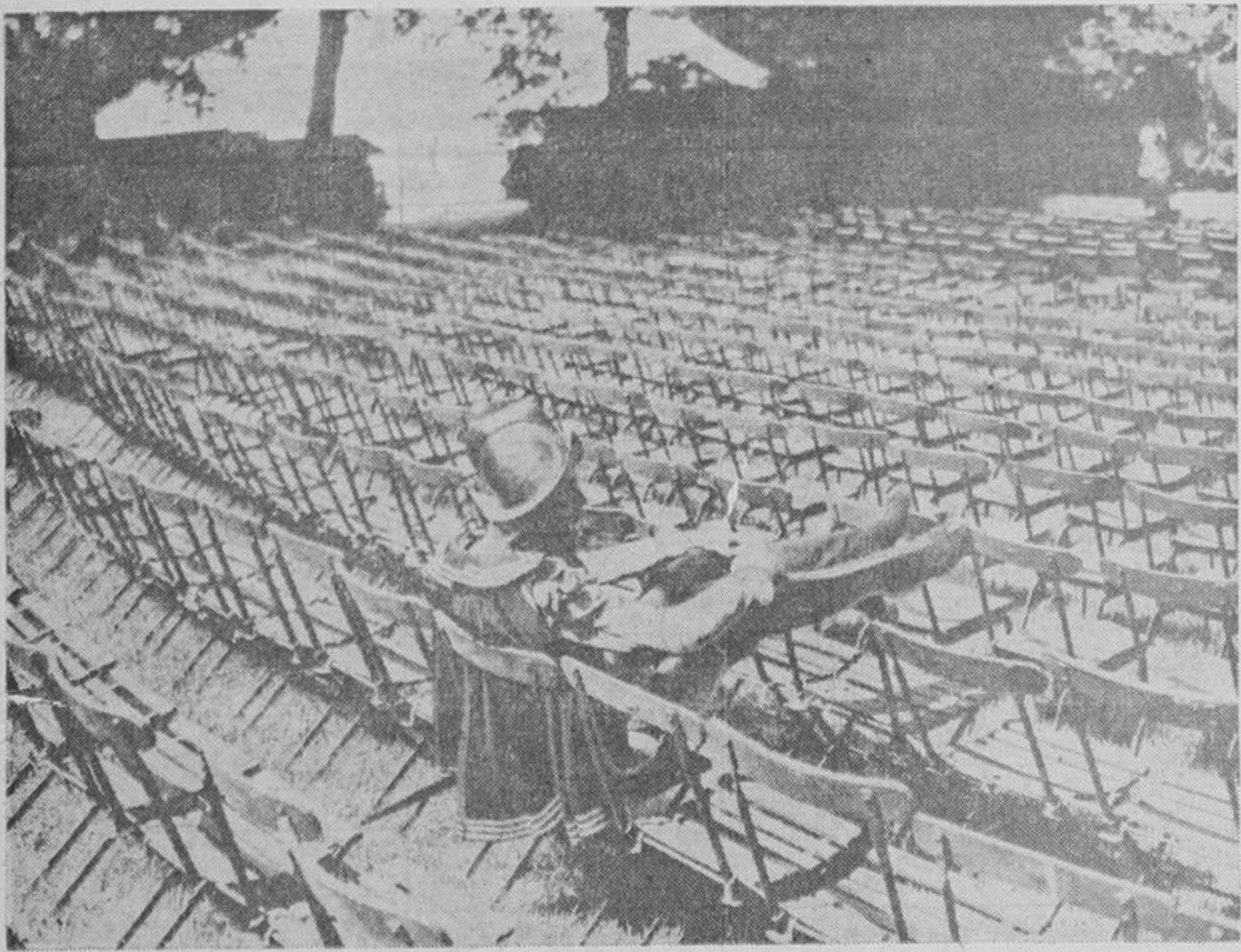


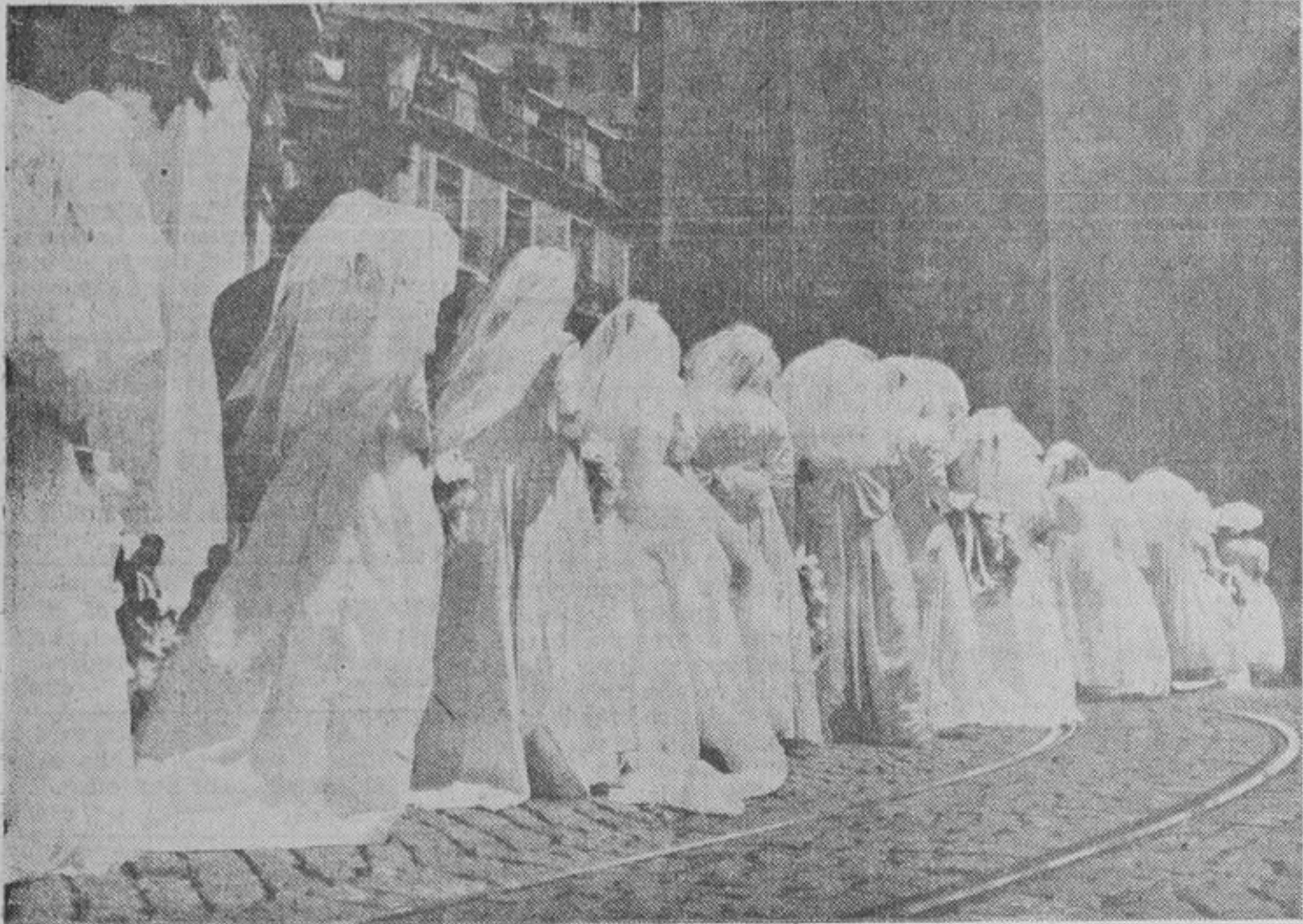

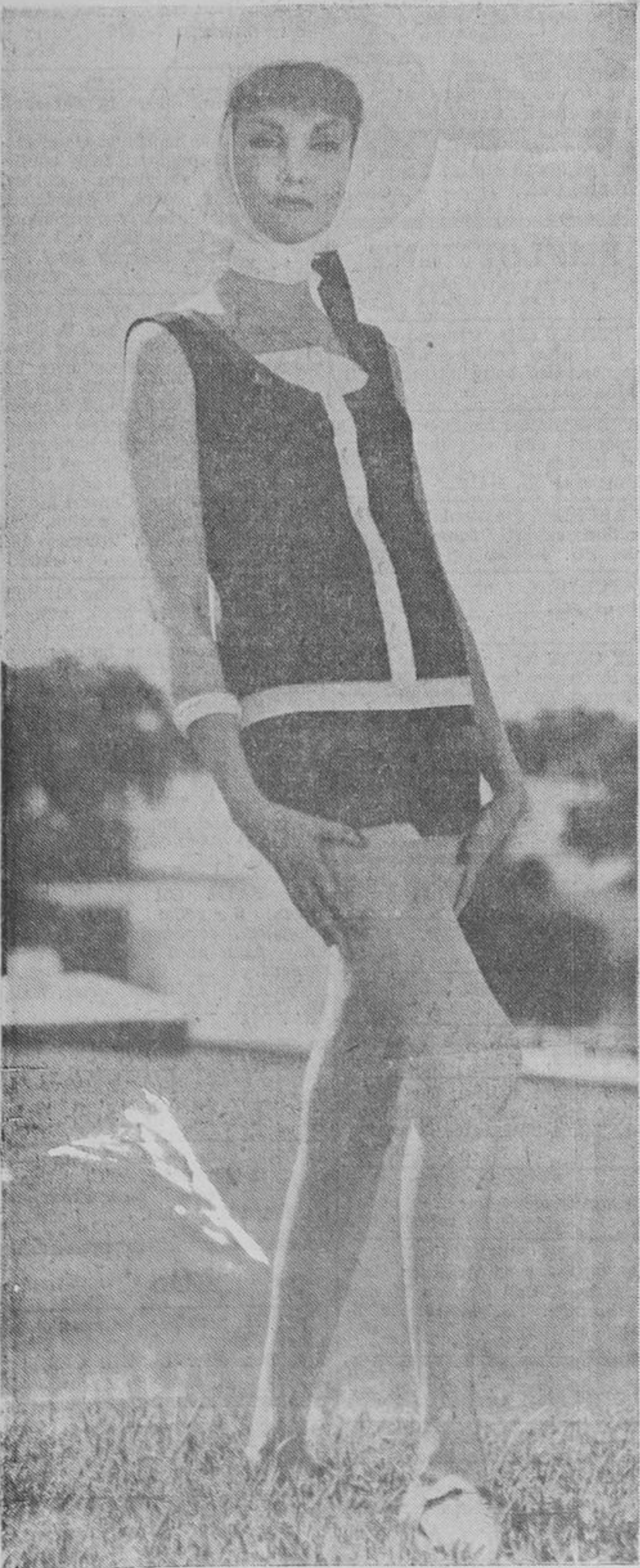

white and blue "little girl" suit. At right is a sophisticated. Provocative lace bodice is sprinkled with rhinestones.



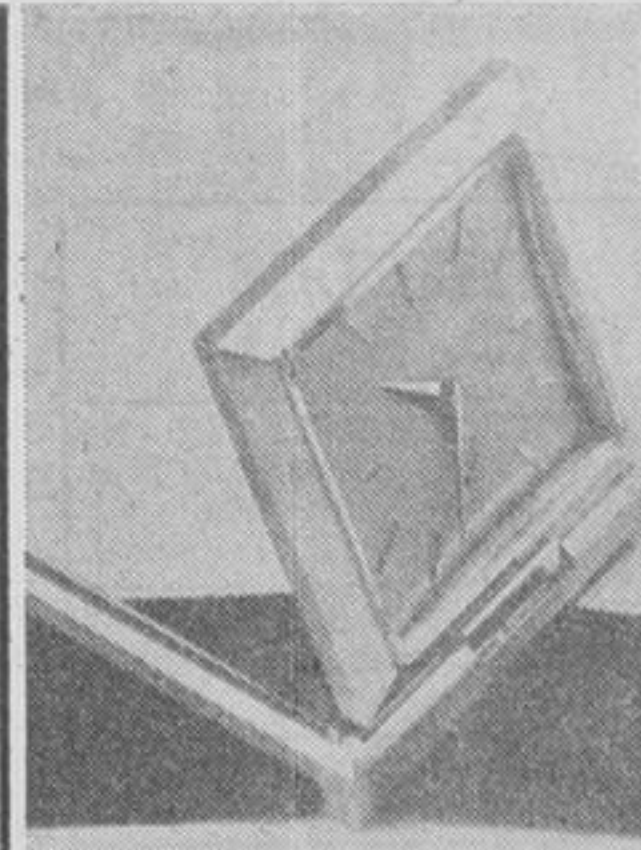

LIGHT MEAL—Janet Holland baked a cake for her pet, Smudge, for his 12th birthday in Surrey, England. He ate the candles.

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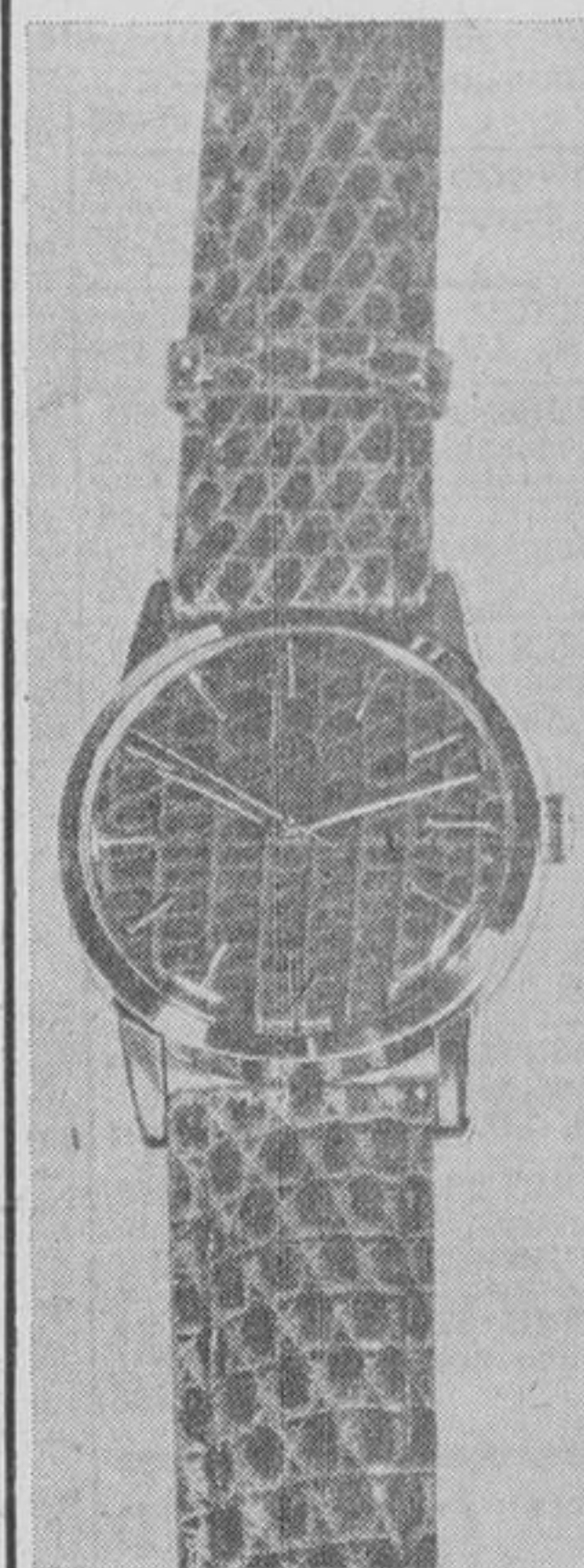
It's About Time



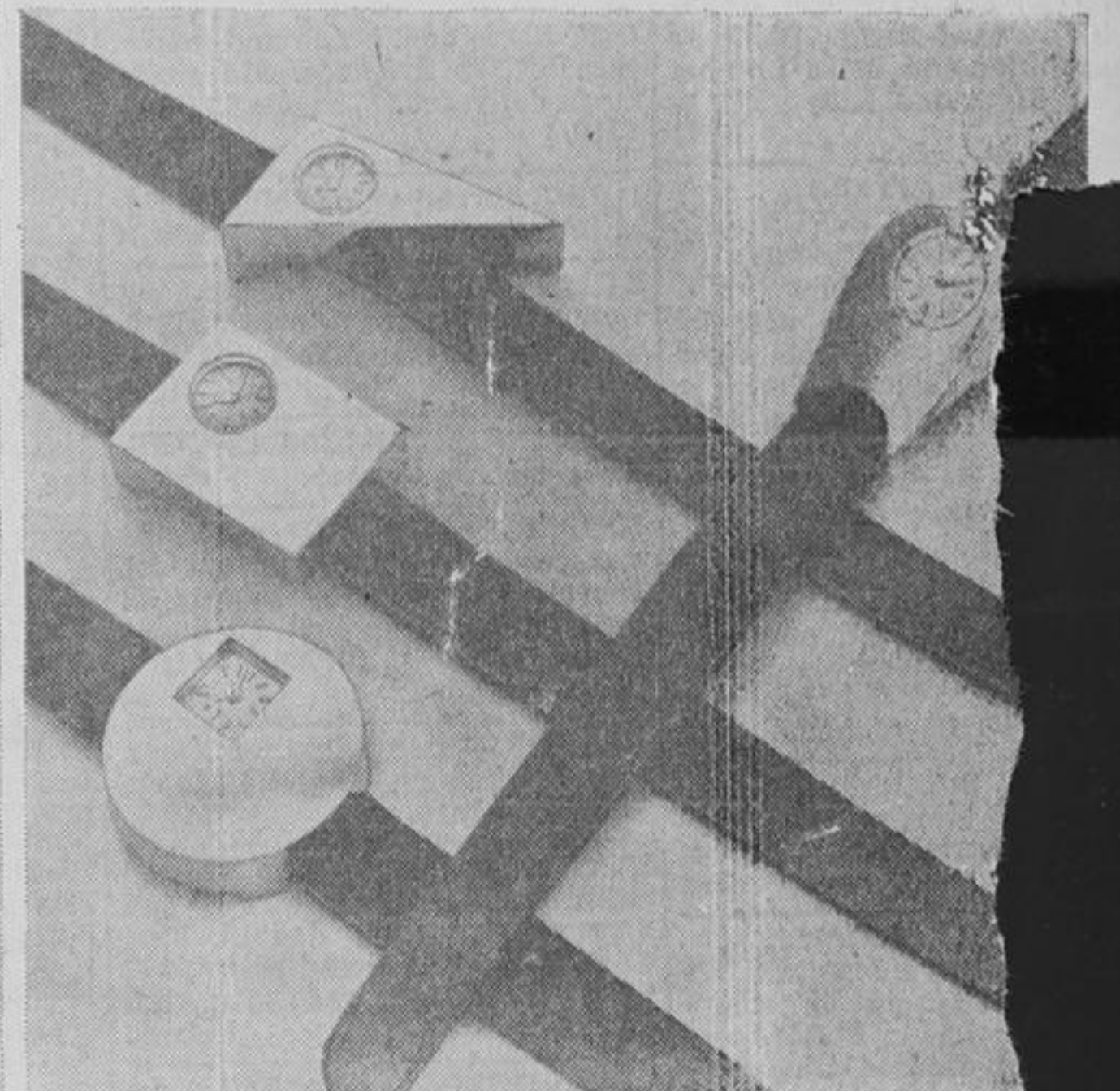
For easy visibility, this Swiss watch can be tilted up on end.

THE WORD from the 1959 Watch fair in Basel, Switzerland, is: "Take your time in fanciful doses this year." Swiss watchmakers set their clockwork far ahead with fantastic and futuristic results at the annual fair. High fashion jewelry and quality timepieces are displayed. The watches are big and bold, or brief as a second. Their cases are thick as matchboxes, or thin as knife blades. Some attach to car keys and buzz alarms against overtime parking. Others stand on edge atop the wrist. Still others have dials to match the leather or silk watch bands. The Swiss really have broken away from the time-honored styles.



ACCEPTED BY THE NAVY—The U. S. Navy has accepted delivery from Goodyear Aircraft corporation of the first of a new class of airships, the ZPG-3W, largest non-rigid airship ever built—408 feet long, 118 feet high with 1,500,000 cubic feet of helium in a cotton neoprene envelope. The airship, first of four designed strictly for airborne early warning missions, flew to Lakehurst, N. J.
