(Continued from page 1) and adequate lights. "We heard that some promise a year ago" said a member of the delegation. "People are up in arms about the situation" he said. It was pointed out that while the Toronto and York Roads Commission has fallen down in maintenance work due to lack of funds in its budget, the town is carrying out maintenance operations to keep the road in passable condition. Councillor Broadhurst suggested Town representatives on County Council look into the situation. "Would you say the road was in a deplorable condition at five o'clock at night" asked deputy-reeve Tinker. "No, not to night" agreed the deputation spokesman. "We're doing the best we can under the changing weather conditions" said Mr. Tinker. The delegation's request sparked a considerable discussion by council members as to the need of expediting necessary works, and the danger and possibility of unnecessary delays. Councillor Tom Broadhurst suggested a works committee member be designated as a special expediter for each project. Mayor Tomlin said much of the delay was due to provincial boards and departments. Councillor Mrs. Southwell agreed with the value of an expediter. "You must constantly ride hard to get action" she said "we found that out on the School Board."

Seek Legal Advice

Donald Plaxton spoke on behalf of Harry Saddler seeking a building permit for a fourplex on Wood Lane. The proposed building is to be located behind an existing house and it was pointed out that this is contrary to local regulations. The matter has been subject of controversy for some time and a delegation of residents of the area made recent protests to council. It was decided to seek the advice of the town solicitor. At one time the owner had suggested two fourplexes on the same lot.

Show National Gallery Paintings R. Hill Library All Month January

The Richmond Hill Public Library is sponsoring an exhibition of Canadian paintings in the Art gallery of the library during the month of January. This exhibition is on loan to the library from the National Gallery of Canada and can be seen during library hours. The exhibition contains sketches and small paintings by late 19th and early 20th century Canadian artists. This collection of works by some early Canadian painters illustrates the various art traditions from which Canadian art has stemmed. Small paintings invite close attention and the observer will be rewarded by examining the content and techniques, to discover the influences which have affected the artist's point of view as well as his sources of information. Among the highlights of the collection are a small oil by Cornelius Krieghoff called "The Toll Gate," one of the best-known Indian paintings called "The Assiniboines" by Paul Kane, and several paintings of the French Canadian scene by Clarence Gagnon, Albert H. Robinson and James Wilson Morrice. This group of smaller works, in addition to their intrinsic charm and interest, present very important clues to the way art in this country has developed. Artists working today in Canada are found to be adventurous in spirit just as these early pioneer artists were, with a zest for seeking first-hand experience of this country, of exploring new techniques and various approaches in expressing the Canadian scene. Although the trend away from realism is now a dominant characteristic of most Canadian exhibitions, these small representative works indicate how European art took root here in Canada, branching in many directions. This group of paintings is the first to be brought into Richmond Hill by the public library. In April, the library will be showing an exhibit of Graphic Art in Canada. The public is cordially invited to visit these exhibitions and the Librarians would be most pleased to receive comments about them.
