The Deputy-reeve however opposed this, stating that competitive bids should be obtained or this estimate should be re-submitted as a firm bid. Councillor Anstey supporting the Deputyreeve's view added that an estimate on a time and materials basis could go up to four or five thousand in this case although he added that he did not suggest it would. He said you would not buy a car on an estimate but

would want a fixed price. To which Councillor Ralph replied that "you can't get an auto repair job on a fixed price but have to accept an estimate." The Deputy-reeve suggested there were plenty of people who would be happy to give a fixed price. Councillor Bryson put in that the only point about that would

reeve replied that it would delay work for only a week for a competitive bid. The Clerk pointed out that there were no specifications on which to bid. To which the Deputy-reeve suggested, "Well, why not an hourly rate plus cost of materials?" Councillor Bryson asked what then would happen if it was decided to make a change in the plans. 
