Vote On Licence

(Continued from Page 1) involved a subject which was always, rightly or wrongly, a matter for heated controversy. To enable the people to decide the issue on its own value and to prevent it becoming an election issue and also because there are some people who would be eligible to vote on this matter but not in a municipal election, it was wise to hold the plebiscite independently and this would also avoid confusion. Offers Financial Contribution If the electors decided that this old by-law should be repealed, then the township would benefit in the three spheres of assessment, revenue and progress, declared Mr. Bailey. He concluded by stating that the group had given thought to the matter of the cost of a plebiscite and that they had decided to offer to assist towards this cost if such assistance was acceptable by council.

dress won applause. Get Bottles On Top of Table Councilor Anstey then took the stand to say that "anything we can do to get the bottles from under the table and on top of the counter would be welcome and might aid in reducing drunkenness. "Always at parties and dances we see the spectacle of people reaching for the table for illicit bottles," he went on to say, "and the result is that instead of a glass or two which would be the limit if it were legal, the lawbreaker probably ends up by consuming a whole bottle." This statement drew loud applause.

Supports Liquor Freedom Councilor Ralph said that a certain percentage of the electorate could compel the Council by law to pass a by-law as was wished or the Council may in its wisdom grant such a request. He felt the present attendance warranted council agreement to the application. Crime will come into growing urban areas anyway he declared. Much of the crime resulting from drinking of alcohol resulted more from its use illegally which tended to excess rather than to drinking in itself. "Most of us are going to use it in spite of everyone," he added and we now only have to go to Richmond Hill or North York to get it. "This township cannot compete with other growing areas without alcohol," said Councilor Ralph and he advised the Council should enact the required law and permit the people to be the final judge in the matter.

Tables Motion Reeve John Perry then asked if any member of Council wished to table a motion. Councilor Ralph said he would do so favouring the application subject to the financial assistance offered being given by the group requesting the plebiscite. He stated that the Council was not sure financial assistance could be accepted but added that "if we can legally accept it, we'll be grateful." Followed some discussion on this point. The Deputy-reeve asked Mr. Bailey to explain what costs his group thought they could contribute towards the plebiscite.

Democratic Right Mr. Bailey indicated no deep thought had been given or anything particularly specified. "We are asking for a democratic right and will go from door to door throughout the area if need be. However we did not consider that a proper course. We knew that a plebiscite would cost money and were prepared to assist reasonably. It appears now it would cost more than we anticipated. Councilor Anstey said he went along with Mr. Bailey and Council had no right to expect more. He said he would second Councilor Ralph's motion to grant the application. Motion Carried The motion was then carried by the majority with Councilor Bryson opposing.

Police Car Tender Earlier Council had considered tenders for a police car and accepted the bid of Hillcrest Motors at a net cost of \$764. Delivery was promised in three weeks. Until the arrival of the 100 person delegation only eight people attended in the public gallery. One of them was Mr. Dugald McCowan, local businessman and Chairman of the Co-ordinating Committee sometimes referred to as "Little Metro".

Mix-Up of Names In my report last week the names of Councilors were somewhat mixed up. I cannot however accept any responsibility for this. Having only recently commenced coverage of this Council's meetings and not knowing the members of council, I have been dependent upon the name plates which are set on the rostrum before each council member. Last week these name plates had become mixed. A naming board meeting earlier had moved them around. Thus the name in front of Councilor Ralph was that of Anstey and Mr. Ralph's name appeared in front of Mr. Bryson. Thus everything which was attributed in the report last week to Councilor Ralph should be credited to Councilor Anstey and everything attributed to Councilor Anstey should be credited to Councilor Ralph.

Councilor Anstey was in fact not present but was absent in Montreal. This led to a joke now current in the Council that, although in Montreal, Councilor Anstey made a good speech in Maple. This week, Councilors were careful to check at the correct nameplate appeared before them. But after this, my fifth attendance, I think I know them well enough to do without the nameplates.

Motel Licence Question of renewal of a licence to Pinerest Motel came up before Council and led to some discussion. Frame buildings which form part of the motel establishment were an alleged fire hazard. Mr. Ralph made a strong speech in defence of the Motel which elicited from the Reeve the remark, "Are you making a charge for this speech?" The Reeve did not object to an extension of the licence which was granted.

Discussion of Estimate The Reeve then indicated that the subject of the replanning of office accommodations had been explored by Councilor Ralph and that he had everything ready. The Reeve said he was happy with it. A diagram was produced by the Clerk and studied. An estimate for the installation of partitions and organization at a cost of \$3,458 had been received. It was on a time and materials basis. Councilor Bryson said he favoured proceeding immediately because the matter was urgent. The school board needed the ac-

commodation. Deputy Reeve's Opposition The Deputy-reeve however opposed this, stating that competitive bids should be obtained or the estimate should be resubmitted as a firm bid. Councilor Anstey supporting the Deputy-reeve's view added that an estimate on a time and materials basis could go up to four or five thousand in this case although he added that he did not suggest it would. He said you would not buy a car on an estimate but would want a fixed price. To which Councilor Ralph replied that "you can't get an auto repair job on a fixed price but have to accept an estimate." The Deputy-reeve suggested there were plenty of people who would be happy to give a fixed price. Councilor Bryson put in that the only point about that would be that the job, already urgent, would be held up. The Deputy-reeve replied that it would delay work for only a week for a competitive bid. The Clerk pointed out that there were no specifications on which to bid. To which the Deputy-reeve suggested, "Well, why not an hourly rate plus cost of materials?" Councilor Bryson asked what then would happen if it was decided to make a change in the plans. To which Councilor Anstey replied that "you shouldn't want to change - you ought to know what you want before you start - we should know what we are spending on."

Let's Face It! Councilor Bryson replied, "Let's face it, it is going to cost, we have a good estimate. I don't think it can get out of hand. Perhaps this is not regular procedure but this is a case where we know what is involved." Councilor Anstey said he did not understand why anyone willing to give the estimate should not make it a firm bid, "everything is broken down with costs detailed," he concluded. Reeve Resolves Tied Vote After calling upon the members to make up their minds, the Reeve asked for a vote. Councilors Bryson and Ralph supported and said the work should proceed. The Deputy-reeve and Councilor Anstey opposed and suggested competitive bids should be sought. The Reeve decided this tie by casting a vote in favour of the estimate being accepted and immediately proceeded with it.

Planning Dept. Report Mr. Tom Gillings of the Planning and Building Department then presented the report of his department for 1959. It was a concise report based on information gathered from the minutes of the Planning Board meetings and from records kept by the department. During the year the department had held 21 regular meetings and one special meeting.

The meetings considered 333 individual items, 117 applications to sever and create new building lots, 25 applications to support amendments to township by-laws, 29 applications for consideration of sub-division plans which number includes applications considered more than once, 20 sets of deeds submitted to the board's "Consent to Register" and 42 miscellaneous items. Of these applications, 108 were approved, 32 refused and 31 deferred. Majority of those deferred were subsequently reconsidered and either approved or refused.

Township Statistics During the year 76 new residential buildings lots were created, 21 by-law amendments affected or presented to the Ontario Municipal Board and 18 parcels of land were conveyed to the Township as either road widenings or new road allowances. A total of 17 residential lots and 7 industrial lots were registered throughout the area of Kleinburg, Maple, Woodbridge (East), Richvale (South), Edgely and Pine Grove (North). A total of lots numbering 2679 with 3453 residential units were approved for subdivision development.

Population of the township in 1959 was given as 16,033, an increase of 1305 over the figure for 1957. This total was broken down as follows: 5 yrs. and under 3297 (pre-school) 6-13 years 2881 (public school) 14-19 years 1364 (high school) 20-64 8405 (working) 65 and over 1084 (retired) The estimated labour force was 6,170.

Assessment Figures Assessment figures were given as: Residential \$13,533,973 or 59.27 per cent of the total. Farms \$5,824,827 or 25.33 per cent of the total. Commercial \$2,979,368 or 13.03 per cent of the total. Industrial \$485,018 or 2.37 per cent of the total. This represents a total assessment of \$22,823,186 as compared with \$9,928,714 in 1957.

Councilor Anstey said he was glad to note the department was paying its own way while Deputy-reeve Vic Ryder complimented Mr. Gillings in the manner in which the report had been prepared. Suggests Snow Plough In connection with the purchase of a four ton truck approved at a previous meeting, Reeve Perry wondered whether a snow plough could not be purchased for use with the truck as occasion warranted. The Township has to employ outside companies for snow clearance and he thought this would prove a good investment over a period of time. The Deputy-reeve suggested this might call for an investment of \$3,000. Councilor Ralph was asked to investigate and to obtain estimates.

Following this discussion the Council recessed for the admission and settling of the large delegation and subsequent discussion on liquor already reported fully above.
