Church Landmark Roof Collapsed

Collapse of the roof of Sacred Heart Church, in King Township's Catholic Settlement, Fifth Concession Line, may prove a "blessing in disguise". Father John Brennan told "The Liberal" the building was insured for \$9,000 fire protection and if the present loss is covered, the congregation would have their new building fund boosted.

Seeking \$35,000 for a new church to accommodate a growing parish, the congregation pledged last fall \$36,000 to be paid over a three year period. The fund actually has \$4,000 now.

A few hours after the Friday evening service, when parishioners could hear the peaking roof creaking, it completely caved in under the pressure of heavy rain and high winds. Fortunately no one was in the building when the roof fell around three o'clock morning.

The white framed one-roomed building was built about 30 years ago by Schomburg residents, before the Catholic Settlement was started.

No services are being missed, in spite of the building's loss. Weekday mass is observed as usual at the convent, administered by Father Brennan and Father O'Neill. Sunday masses are being held in the school basement, where the altar and pews were transferred.

World Premiere Nature Record Richmond Hill

In second and first class Guide Tests, four important ways are stressed: (1) Intelligence, (2) Handicraft, (3) Health, (4) Service. Under Intelligence, you would find such items as playing staking games, accident awareness, how and where to summon a doctor, police and fire aid, use the compass and find 16 points, find points by the sun and stars, organize, and take two Guides under first class on a half day hike, cooking one meal out-doors. Handicraft deals with knots, fire-making, darning, cutting out and sewing together, a simple garment. Health stresses the need for cleanliness, proper rest, ability to swim, float, know water safety precautions and how to perform the Halger Neilson method of artificial respiration. Service deals with community knowledge, so you would be able to direct a stranger to a certain place correctly. I am sure that Guides will be even more in number and enthusiasm when the year 2010 rolls around, and I for one will be proud to say that I have been a Guide.

Fifty Years Old! Barbara Lowens 4th Richmond Hill Guides This year Guiding celebrates its fiftieth birthday. Guides from all over Ontario and outstanding Guides and Brownies met at Eaton auditorium in Toronto two weeks ago and a large party was held on the occasion. Started by Baden-Powell in 1910, they were called Guides after the alert guards of the Northwest Indian border. They would be trained in such a way that they would live up to their motto of "Be Prepared." Of course, his wife, Lady Baden-Powell, became the first World Chief of Guides. In 1912, Guides were organized in Canada under Lady Pellet as first Chief Commissioner - a post she held for 9 years. In the same year, the Canadian Guide headquarters were established in Toronto. After fifty years, the standards of Guiding are just as high as they originally were, or even higher. The uniform, however, has changed with the rest of the fashion world, from a long-skirted monstrosity to a modern-day uniform that enables today's Guides to move more freely. It makes our mothers' old camp uniforms seem out-dated. Guides are a decidedly hard-working and conscientious group.
