Markham Twp. Council Highland Park Ratepayers Request Safety Measures

A petition signed by Highland Park residents requesting that Love Lumber Co. should not re-build its lumber yard and warehouses on Yonge Street, was ruled null and void by the petitioners who presented it — with a strong plea that instead, the building inspector be instructed not to issue a permit to rebuild until certain safety features were incorporated into the lumber company's re-building plans.

Three Highland Park ratepayers, Messrs. E. Frey, D. Dobson and E. Hampson, appeared before Markham Township Council on Monday afternoon and after Mr. Hampson had read the petition, presented earlier to the township planning board, Mr. Frey voiced the changes which the group had made to their appeal, after they had learned this commercial property could not be re-zoned as residential.

Mr. Hampson said first that the recent \$250,000 lumber fire had threatened surrounding homes, and that had taught the residents a lesson. He then suggested the following five points as part of the new plans: (1) Fire proof construction of buildings. (2) Installation of a sprinkler system. (3) A minimum of 16 feet in the rear of the building (which will be L-shaped) for the passage of fire trucks. (4) Concerned with traffic on Woodward at the western extremity of the lumber yard parking lot, he said, "We want the access moved closer to Yonge St." (5) Drainage—"A large size parking area would present problems with run-off, are the drains and culverts in order for this, or would it create further problems?"

However Mr. Frame said, "The petition indicates the concern of the residents of re-construction of the lumber company—but since we learned at the Planning Board meeting Love is going to have a better building and that there will be less fire hazard, we now beseech Council before the building permit is approved to let us see the plans." He then suggested the following five points as part of the new plans: (1) Fire proof construction of buildings. (2) Installation of a sprinkler system. (3) A minimum of 16 feet in the rear of the building (which will be L-shaped) for the passage of fire trucks. (4) Concerned with traffic on Woodward at the western extremity of the lumber yard parking lot, he said, "We want the access moved closer to Yonge St." (5) Drainage—"A large size parking area would present problems with run-off, are the drains and culverts in order for this, or would it create further problems?"

Mr. Dodson spoke briefly stating, "We did find out from the Planning Board it is doomed commercial; so if it's going to be commercial let it be so—but with an eye to the welfare of the nearby residents. Any building should be far enough away from the lot on either side so fire trucks can get in."

Reeve William Clark said, "I think we can promise you this—that when the plans are presented we will contact some of you and make sure you see them. I think it is only common sense to do as you suggest. We are interested in everything you said and assure you we will do everything we can to have those suggestions carried out."

McKay Shopping Centre
Clerk Harry Crisp read a letter received from Richmond Hill Council stating "We will supply water for the Dominion store only." Reeve Clark said that in conversation with Dr. R. King, medical health officer, the doctor had said he would much sooner have Richmond Hill hook them into the sewage disposal tank—but if they could not, he would issue them a permit to build one."

Metro Plan
The proposed plan of Metropolitan Toronto has met with much controversy among the fringe municipalities and when the subject appeared on last Monday's agenda, Reeve Clark said it had been suggested to him that the fringe municipalities get together before they met with Metro representatives the week of March 14. "I think there are so many changes to be made, they'll never get it put through as it is," the reeve remarked.

Metro had suggested three dates for Markham's meeting with them, March 16, 17 and 18. When several council members pointed out prior commitments the clerk said "You are not at the beck and call of Mr. Jones—you set your own date."

Stating it was a case of divide and conquer—the reeve reiterated there should certainly be a special meeting of the northern municipalities before seeing Metro. "We can go on record as far as we are personally concerned—but we have to collectively work on this thing (in the fringe areas)."

In replying to a question from The Liberal that the press be notified of the inter-municipal meeting regarding the Metro Plan, Reeve Clark said, "We have nothing to hide in our objection to the present plan, I do not see why the press could not be present."

Annexation Costs
Markham Council unanimously agreed with the recommendation of the Township of Crowland that "Municipalities annexing in another Municipality, should bear the costs of defense in annexation proceedings."

Deputy-reeve W. Dean said it had been noted at a recent meeting of the Ontario Agriculture Federation that there is growing dissatisfaction through annexation.

Reeve Clark said, "We don't oppose annexation but we would like to set the appropriation amount and prevent municipalities from annexing valuable land—and leaving other land behind."

Once again the Metro Plan came to the fore as the reeve stated emphatically that Metro had never supplied Markham Township with any services. The Metro Plan at present annexes
