Before there was a post office at the Elgin Mr. Andrew Newton, who resided in the house where the late Mr. Matt Patton lived for many years, carried the mail from Richmond Hill to Elgin Mills, around 1880 a post office was opened in the general store and Mr. Mike Naughton, Mr. Harry Naughton's uncle, became the first Post Master, a position he held for many years.
