The deputy-reeve said the Authority must have some indication it will be approved by the Federal government, or they would not have sent this letter. before it goes to Toronto! The flood control plan came into being after Hurricane Hazel, the reeve noted, and the deputyreeve added that through this plan 15 dams will be built thus creating new lakes and recreation areas. He did state however that it appeared the people of Metro Toronto derived more benefit from conservation areas than did suburban or rural residents.

There is no plan for benefitting Markham Township this year but Woodbridge, North York and Markham Village will be benefitted. The Flood Control Plan calls for the expenditure of \$40 million dollars, spread over a 10 year period, costs of which are principally borne by Metro

Reeve Clark asked, "Does this Council wish us to imbibe this in our budget this year." Deputy-reeve Dean said he didn't think there was anything else to do. "We have already approved the plan and we have to accept their levy."

Councillor Mumberson agreed saying the Authority's Plan was County wide and went far beyond York, and we have a number of streams in this township which may some day be made into lakes. There is no knowing today where conservation may


