HOPPY EVENT

MARK TWAIN started it all when he heard the story of the Jumping Frog of Calaveras county, at Angel's Camp, Calif. Today, Angel's Camp keeps the memory of the humorist and his famous story alive with the Jumping Frog Jubilee. Crowds up to 24 thousand have watched these hop, skip and jump matches of the best 15 frogs. A frog jump is recorded as total of three jumps—like a hop, skip and jump. Distance is measured in straight line from starting point. One of the top records for a frog jump is 16 feet, 10 inches, made by a frog named Lucky in 1954. All jumping purses are paid in cash. Total top purse of \$1,000 is paid to any frog bettering the world mark and \$500 to first one equalling the record. If the record is not broken or equalled, first place prize money is then worth only \$300.
