The Kraus-Weber test showed that 69.7% of American children failed a set of physical tests, whereas in a comparable group of European children only 8.7% failed."

failed. Prince Phillip, President Eisenhower, T. V., the Press, and various periodicals have all added fuel to the movement toward Fitness. Educators and Recreation leaders should accept as their goal - "To motivate and inspire every child to his greatest possible potential." In our school Physical Education programme we can develop skills and interests in many forms of physical recreation.

Mr. Peter Ross presented, with the aid of recent films his work in class, showing basketball, softball, track and field, volleyball, and gymnastics. He also mentioned their hockey and soccer programmes.

Mr. Babcock then presented with the aid of films and charts, the High School programme of Physical Education. He emphasized clearly that good classroom instruction is the basis for intramural, interschool, recreation, and adult activity. At our own high school fourteen different sports are available to every student in the intramural program. In addition there are 8 interschool sports. Saturday morning basketball offers pure recreation for another hundred boys and Night School opens the Physical Education door to energetic men.

Mr. Babcock briefly outlined a group of activities which the family can enjoy as a unit, regardless of age, and with the aid of a chart showed all the recreation activities available in our town.

Mrs. Jean Thomson, director of Recreation for Richmond Hill, outlined the Playground Program for 1966. Mrs. Dorothy Turner spoke of the extensive softball activities and urged volunteers coaches and umpires to assist with this venture. Mr.

Babcock showed the swimming programme at Richmond Hill Day Camp; the boys of Richmond Hill Teen Camp on their canoe trip in beautiful Algonquin Park; and a movie of track and field showing the grace and skill acquired in this sport.

A panel, consisting of Mr. Jack Passmore, Prof. of Physical Education, Ontario College of Education, U. of T., Mr. Robt. Newman, Mr. Duard Rose, Mrs. Virginia Sully, and Mrs. Dorothy Turner were invited to evaluate the presented programme of recreation.

(1) All agreed that the programme was sound, inviting, challenging.

(2) There must be a place in the programme for every child.

(3) That there is no danger of undue emotional or physical strain to the highly skilled competitor.

(4) Mr. Passmore expressed concern that many communities do not make use of the excellent facilities they may have, and urged us to be sure to make full use of the facilities we have around us. It was agreed that both Public and High School Boards have been most co-operative in allowing their increasingly excellent facilities to be used for community recreation.

When asked why he thought there were so many people happily engaged in recreation work, Mr. Babcock quoted the Chinese poet Wang Wei, "You ask me what is the supreme happiness here below, it is watching a little boy go whistling down the road after he has asked me the way."

Mr. Smithies thanked Mr. Babcock for his inspiring programme and expressed his sincere thanks to all those who assisted in its presentation and evaluation.
