

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

Mrs. E. Roy (Dorothy) Bradley and children, Colin, Brian, John and Ross left last night from Richmond Hill to sail today on the Sax-onia for England, Mrs. Bradley will make her home near her parents Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Gray, Hayes, Middlesex.

During the fourteen years Mrs. Bradley has lived in Canada, she has won the respect and loving sympathy of many in Richmond Hill and district communities: for two of her loved ones, her eldest son, Roger, who came to Canada as a four-year-old boy with Dorothy and Roy Bradley in 1946 was tragically killed on Highway 11, a few years later, as he ran happily down a hill outside his school to catch the school bus. Then in December 1957 her husband, who suffered from injuries received in World War 11, died, and Dorothy was left with four young sons, the baby not

quite a year old. Despite the tragedies she endured - the last alone with no relatives of her own immediate family in Canada to share the burden - Dorothy Bradley always wore a gentle smile. She sang in the church choirs of St. John's Jefferson and after moving to Richmond Hill, in St. Mary's Anglican Church

"I have loved my life in Canada, despite everything," Dorothy told "The Liberal," 'but for the sake of my boys who need a family of aunts and uncles and cousins close at hand, I have decided it is best to go back to England."
