The Churches and World Refugee Year

Rev. Dr. William James Gallagher, General Secretary of the Canadian Council of Churches, will be the speaker on Monday evening, May 2, at Richmond Hill United Church Woman's Association in the Christian Education Building.

Dr. Gallagher is well-known in the United Church of which he is an ordained minister. In 1942 he became general secretary of

Christian Social Council of Canada and when the Canadian Council of Churches was organized in 1944, he became its General Secretary. In addition to his responsibilities as general secretary, Dr. Gallagher is also its Secretary for Ecumenical Affairs. Among other things these include support of the World Council's work among refugees and displaced persons. It is this aspect of his work which is to be emphasized in his talk. Through Inter-Church Aid, the World Council of Churches has been carrying on a program of refugees in many parts of the world for a number of years. Since World Refugee Year has brought the needs of all refugees to our attention in very dramatic ways, this is a most opportune time to learn what the churches have done and can do to help relieve some of the most amenable of refugee problems. As a community we have shown concern for those in need on many occasions. Now we are being challenged to share in one of the greatest humanitarian movements the world has ever known. Dr. Gallagher's address will be of interest to all denominations and particularly to those who are members or associates of the Canadian Council of Churches. This is an open meeting and the public is cordially invited.

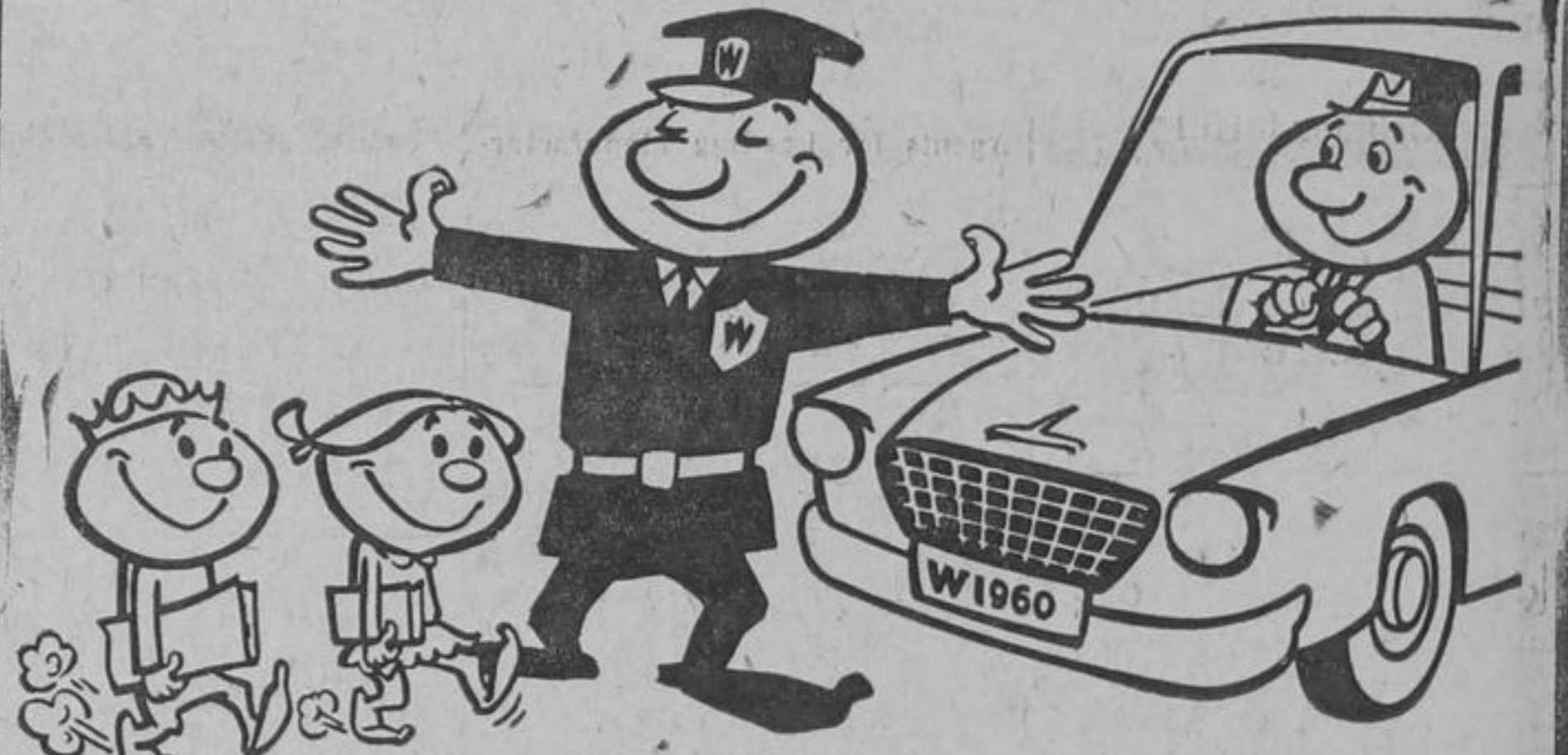
