Mr. Ralph told Council he had enquired of Richmond Hill what promotion of industry in Richmond Hill was costing the town l in salaries and had been advised that it was in the region of \$12000. He added, "Here is an adjoining town spending annually twelve thousand in salaries to promote industry. Here in Vaughan Township we have a for free." He went on to produce a map of the proposed sub-divis-ion showing its exact location and distances from distribution centres and other information. "Twelve thousand of these have been printed and given out by the sub-divider" said Mr. Ralph.

He went on to suggest to Council that the sub-divider should be placed in a position that he would know just where he stood. He alleged that this is not the case and he felt strongly he said that Council should direct serious consideration to the industrial sub-division and cooperate with the sub-divider. 
