



It is being established by the historical sites advisory board of the Metropolitan Toronto & Region Conservation Authority on the 86-acre Black Creek Conservation Area (at Jane Street and Steeles Avenue). It will represent an authentic 19th century crossroads community - one of the few of its kind in Canada.


