Another day, I notice that all is not well with my charges. The leaves are being bitten and chewed and some almost beyond recognition. This makes me very sad and discouraged. Some of the plants perish under such treatment but the remainder keep on as if spurred on by an indomitable Will. There must be survival.

Through all this alternate agonizing and rejoicing I feel kinship with the plants. There is always a battle with the weeds that threaten to stop the plant from reaching its final goal, that of bursting into glorious blossom. It is only through my determined efforts that the weeds are prevented from accomplishing their mission aond the flower is allowed to bloom for its allotted time. How like us the flowering plants are, I think to myself. We, too, struggle constantly to survive against the negative forces within and without, sometimes winning, sometimes losing but never giving up as long as there is life.


