

In praising the work of the Planning Board members the Mayor said "you couldn't have a more dedicated group of pub-

meeting to the council. Mr. McAdam - It was a simple matter after all. It was just a case of a lost letter.

Councillor Broadhurst said he didn't think there was any need for injured feelings. Council has a duty to perform and we just asked the Planning Board to come here and clarify some things. "Surely they're not such prima donnas they can't stand being asked some questions." said Mr. Broadhurst.

Council concurred in a recommendation of the Planning Board that the request of Jack Seaton for re-zoning of some six acres in the north part of town be refused. The request was to rezone the acreage as residential instead of industrial to permit

the building of apartment houses. Mr. Todd said the Planning Board assisted attempts to rezone needed industrial land. On motion of Reeve Haggart and Deputy Reeve Tinker Planning Board will be asked to draw up ndustrial development.

Council asked the Building Committee to bring in a report on the need for a by law regulating swimming pools in town Planning Board recommended the need for some control. Councillor Bradstock said that until such a by law is brought in the pools require a building permit Questioned by Deputy-reeve Tinker as to the potential health hazard of pools Mayor Tomlin said this phase of control rests with the York County Health

Yonge Street may have another gas station. Application was made for a license for a Texaco station at Yonge and Harding. This is the property where the old George Harding farm house is located. The land has a frontage of 280 feet on Yonge Street, but the gas station is to be only 150 feet and the balance is planned for other commercial development. Councillor Mrs. Southwell enquired about the possibility of a planting area to separate the business from the residential area. On motion of Reeve Haggart the request for a gasoline licence was referred to the Buildings Committee.

Under consideration for many nonths the Air Pollution by law, or Smoke Control regulations were finally passed by council. The by law designed to rid the town of any smoke nuisance was given its several readings and unanimous support. It will come into effect within ninety days. Councillor Whillans expressed regret at the delay. "T hoped" he said "that this by faw would be in effect before the heating season started." A long time advocate of the smoke control regulations Councillor John Bradstock sighed with satisfaction when he heard the third reading. "It's taken a long time" he said.

On motion of Reeve Haggart and Councillor Mrs. Margaret Southwell two members of council will form a committee with two members of the legal profession to request the establishment of a criminal court in Richmond Hill. At present all criminal cases for the County are heard at Newmarket. "It costs money to send constables to Newmarket" said the Reeve "and moreover I don't like to see our police out (of town when they should be on


