Additional 500 Mary Gage - Gold Cord Guide Bell Terminals

An additional 500 terminals, each representing a telephone number, have now been installed in the Bell Telephone Company's AVenue 5 exchange in Thornhill. W. C. Barnes, local manager of the Bell, said this week that these extra facilities give the exchange some 5,000 terminals, and will take care of the normal growth of the district for the immediate future.

Recalling the history of the telephone in Thornhill, Mr. Barnes said telephone service was introduced here in 1888 when a line was built to Richmond Hill. This was a long distance office only, and was managed by Lindsay, Francis and Co., proprietors of a local store and post office.

Exchange service was established, he added, in 1906, and the first local directory listed seven customers. Dial service was introduced in 1952 and the dial exchange building extended in




