### All Electric Dwellings Among Bronze Medallion Grandview Estates Homes

Grandview Estates, as the name suggests, provides an excellent view and overlooks the Don Valley. The site on the north side of Steeles Avenue between Yonge Street and Bayview Avenue was chosen by Schickendanz Bros., the builders of this newest Bronze Medallion subdivision, because of its choice location close to transportation and shopping centres, also schools and churches.

Situated on rolling land, the Grandview Estates subdivision is being laid out in an imaginative manner. The builders have introduced seven basic designs of houses, varying from the two-storey to the split-level, to the bungalow style. Each design has at least two different fronts so that there is no similarity of houses, which eliminates any monotonous appearance.

This year it is planned to build 100 homes in the new subdivision and it is expected that many of these will be electrically heated, qualifying for gold medallion standards, as the demand for this type of comfort living increases.

Two all-electric homes are among the model dwellings that are on display near the entrance to the subdivision. These houses are not furnished so that visitors and prospective buyers may see the space saving features of electric heating and how unobtrusive are the baseboard convector type heaters.

All the houses will have modern, efficient electric water heaters. There will be 100 amp electric service in each house. On the streets there will be no unsightly wires, because backlot construction to take care of the hydro and telephone services will be provided. Only poles on which the lights are mounted will appear on the streets and the wires leading to these poles will be underground.

The subdivision has been planned to please the aesthetic tastes of the prospective buyer. The houses will range from \$19,000, upwards to \$25,000. The area is in suburbia, where there is lots of clean, fresh air, but the subdivision has all the facilities and services of the Metropolitan area, such as paved roads, sidewalks, sewers, water mains and yet it is still within less than thirty minutes normal driving time to the downtown area by two main thoroughfares.
