## Reeve John Perry Invited To Civil Defense Meeting

Reeve John Perry has been

invited to represent Vaughan Township at the National Planning Conference relative to civil defense matters to be held at the Sheraton Connaught Hotel in Hamilton, Ontario, October 23-26 inclusive. The Community Planning Association is urging that as many mayors and reeves as possible attend everywhere in Canada, Meals and accommodations will be provided while the Federal Government will arrange transportation. The conference will be given over to civil defense matters generally but with emphasis on emergency measures and organizational problems and policies in a time of crisis.

## Careless Driving Charge Set Back

Larkham Village Solicitor Paul Mingay voiced concern over a second adjournment of a careless driving case scheduled to be heard in Buttonville Traffic Court on Friday morning. His client faces a careless driving

Magistrate N. P. Kelley stated that it should be impossible to proceed since no court reporter was in attendance.

"With or without a reporter we could not proceed since the pelice officer is not present," stated solicitor Mingay. Magistrate Kelley noted that

he did not favour the dismisal of a careless driving charge. "If it is of such real importance, the officer should be pres-ent," said Mr. Mingay. He pointed out that the damage incurred in

the accident was slight. Magistrate Kelley informed the solicitor that the officer was in a senior court to present evidence in another case. "We will ad-journ the hearing until Novem-ber 18th at which time, the case will proceed or be dismissed," he

A 16-year-old inmate of the House of Concord charged with auto theft on October 18, who asked Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake for a chance to return to the Salvation Army home for boys had his request denied in Monday's Newmarket Court. "You've had your chance," he was told.
