cloth draped over the plants. The culture of mums is relatively easy and they can be propagated by seed or by the division of the clumps and in a third manner of rooting slips. To obtain large single show type blooms, disbudding is carried out by pinching away the lateral buds; however this pinching back should not be continued after the first week of July. Mums are rather bug resistant and the one real pest called the tarnish plant bug can easily be controlled by malathon spray and if mildew on the leaves occurs, a dusting of sulphur should return the plant to a healthy state.
