## Fred Stinson M.P. Says -

# Russian Policy Aims Prolong World Anxiety

"This is a critical time in the history of the world. The gigantic task facing The United Nations today - is to endeavour to produce peace, when so great a sum of money is being spent in many countries to prepare for possible war." Fred C. Stinson, Q.C., M.P. for York Centre, addressing the Annual Meeting of the York Centre Progressive Conservative Association, October 31 at Armour Heights Public School, went on to add - "I am satisfied that the policy of Russia at this time is to avoid serious negotiations, in an effort to prolong the anxiety of the rest of the world."

Speaking to an audience of two hundred members, Mr. Stinson continued - "More than half of the people of the world are living in poverty stricken conditions, which creates political instability. Since such a state operates badly, due to Communism, it behaves

the freedom loving nations to fulfill their responsibilities to those in want." He went on to affirm that Canada has assumed a fair, if not generous share in providing economic assistance to other less fortunate countries. Mr. Stinson commended the Canadian Delegation to the United Nations for their worthy contribution at the current session, where he has been an observer for the past six weeks.

### PLAN GAY CHRISTMAS FOR MENTAL PATIENTS

Barbara Townshend-Carter, past Volunteer Chairman for the York County Christmas campaign, through the medium of this column, wishes to thank the citizens of York County for co-operation in providing Christmas gifts for patients in Mental Hospitals last Christmas. She also desires to thank the Senior citizens of Richmond Hill who did such an exceptional job of sorting, wrapping and tagging presents and who have graciously consented to assist again in this tremendous task. Mrs. Townshend-Carter has been appointed Volunteer Chairman for Christmas gifts for the province of Ontario. Her successor as the Volunteer Chairman for York County is Mrs. Donald D. Strickland of Johnson Ave. in Thornhill. The new volunteer chairman is making another appeal to citizens of the county to put an extra gift on their shopping list. Mrs. Strickland says: "I stress the value of individual giving . . . of a person assuming a personal responsibility in providing Christmas cheer for our mental patients."

Last year, the Canadian Mental Health Association had its first Dominion wide campaign. The York County branch was very active in this project. Thanks to the generosity of the citizens of York County more than 750 presents were given. These were distributed to the persons living in approved homes and to the men at the Ontario Hospital in Aurora. Some of the children's toys were sent to the Thornhaven school for retarded children.

Gift wrapping is optional. The following list is suggested: For men . . . a tie, tobacco and snuff, shaving lotion, candy, ball point pens, games, magazine subscriptions, records and books. For women . . . stockings, gloves, cosmetics, candy, note paper, cigarettes, magazine subscriptions, records and books. Clubs and groups are encouraged to have a shower of gifts. This is only one of the many letters of appreciation that was received by the former local chairman of the York County Mental Health Association.

"To most of us," said Mrs. Townshend-Carter, "Christmas is a time of giving and receiving . . . of family reunions and good will. Some of the hospital patients and residents of approved homes have neither family or friends to remember them during the festive season.
