Students in Grades IX, XI and XIII, in North York schools will shortly be offered the opportunity of a skin test for tuberculosis. The test being used is known as a Vollmer Patch Test and is similar in appearance to an adhesive band-aid.

It is very important to find the people in this age group who, though not having tuberculosis, have been in contact with this disease and have become sensitive to the bacteria which cause tuberculosis. Positive reactors will be X-rayed.


