During 1959 the board spent \$130,000,00 out of current funds. This sum went towards renovating three classrooms in the McConaghy School and the purchase of the Pleasantville site. When Mr. Sanderson first came on the board there was a \$10,000 .on deficit while to-day there is none. Following representations to the Department of Education the board secured an additional \$31,000.00 in Provincial funds. Earlier the Province had cut its grant to Richmond Hill.

Council must assume some responsibility for the rising rate of taxation. Every new home means more children will require accommodation. Subdivision development is under the direct jurisdiction of council. Every five new homes will produce an additional four more children of

Trustee Mrs. Worrell told of her work on the personnel, curriculum and public relations committees. She stated that education is the most important function of any government and that elementary education is the backbone of the educational system. In addition to seeing that the basic subjects are taught well the child should be afforded such cultural subjects as art and music. Mrs. Worrell said she was proud to be a trustee and took an active
