Bishop Hunt To Speak Youth Forum St. Mary's Anglican Church

Next Sunday evening the Presbyter at Evensong at 7 p.m. at St. Mary's Anglican Church will be the Suffragan Bishop of Toronto, Dr. H. R. Hunt. This will be a special youth service after which the young people of the Parish will meet with Bishop Hunt and will discuss the subject of his Sermon, which will be "The Ecumenical Movement in the Church to-day."
This is in keeping with the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity which is being observed this week under the auspices of The World Council of Churches. Bishop Hunt is an authority on this subject, being a Member of the Inter-Church Relations Committee of the Anglican Church of Canada and represented General Synod at the Edinburgh Conference of the World Council last summer.

Refer Colony Cabana Club Development Planning Board

At Vaughan Township Council's second meeting of 1961 last Monday at the Municipal Building, Maple, Deputy-reeve Jesse Bryson, as chairman of the planning and building committee recommended that Reeve A. H. Rutherford be vice-chairman and Thos. Gillings act as secretary of the committee.
One item of business concerned the Colony Cabana Club, designated for a 350-acre parcel of land on the east part of lot 6, Concession 3 (the northwest corner of Dufferin Street and No. 7 Highway). It is proposed to develop a full-fledged golf course, a motel and cafeteria. Council decided that as the entire question revolves around land-use clauses that the matter be referred to the planning board for its recommendations. The board was also handed the matter of Rom-don Estates at No. 7 Highway east of Highway 400. It was pointed out that as the proposed green-belt use would necessitate re-zoning the board make its recommendations.
The Rom-don proposal envisages a \$2,500,000 recreational development on the old 100-acre McLeary Apple Farm at Edgeley, and to include two golf courses (an 18 hole and a 9 hole), a putting range, curling rink, swimming pool and motel. Sam Donnenfield, Toronto, one of the principals, appeared before council last July. Township approval of the development was needed before the Department of Highways would grant approval for a road to run in off Highway 7 in a northeasterly direction.

Appointment
Councillor Maurice Windtatt said it was his opinion that a "neutral" personality should be found to represent Vaughan, Toronto Gore and Woodbridge on the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board. Reeve Rutherford and Deputy-Reeve Bryson were authorized to arrange a meeting with representatives of the other municipalities involved and bring back a recommendation to council.
Police and Fire
The fire and police committee, under the chairmanship of Councillor F. M. Windtatt took action on a problem which has long been a headache for the police department. This concerned the matter of traffic control in the township, particularly in the school areas and the areas in relationship to the Highway Traffic Act. Council accepted a recommendation that the township solicitor be authorized to seek an amendment to one section of the act by deletion of the words "having a population exceeding 60,000." As matters stand, the township police do not have the authority to regulate the speed and post signs in built-up areas because of ambiguous frontage regulations. If the amendment is secured, it means the police will be able to set 30-mile speed limits in present 50-mile areas. The police department never has been able to pin down provincial highway authorities to a clear definition of frontage regulations and the former council either was as much in the dark about the explicit legalities did not feel the matter was important or was indifferent.
The question of school crossing guards will be dealt with also a meeting is to be arranged with the members of the Vaughan Public School Board and an effort will be made to establish a workable policy for use and location of guards. This matter has been hanging fire for a long time and the old council regularly received delegations from anxious parents of school children and perturbed citizens in general.
Mrs. Ruth McConkey was authorized to act as a vice-chairman of all committee meetings for police and fire, while Chief J. Davidson will act as secretary.

The donation of a TV set is acknowledged, and a fund raising campaign is planned to get this senior Scout organization under way. On the evening of January 25th, the executive plans to visit the Thornhill Scout Group, with a view to organizing a Rover Crew in that locality.

Reeve Fry 1961 Warden

Absorption Into Metro Could Be County's Fate Retiring Warden Warns

A warning that failure to cooperate could result in absorption of York County into Metro, and the election of the dean of the Council to the 1961 Wardenship, highlighted the inaugural meeting of York County Council held in the County offices at Newmarket on Tuesday.
The warning came from the retiring Warden, former Markham Township Reeve W. L. Clark, one hundredth occupant of the County's top local legislative seat. Many problems had faced the County during 1960, he said in his "swan song" address. They were continuing ones, he asserted, and included such problems as civil defence, welfare, hospitalization. Unless they were properly handled they could mean the dissolution of the County, he declared.
Pointing out that Bill 80 - the provincial legislation which split up the old County in 1954 and created Metro - the retiring Warden forecast a similar fate for the present County unless municipalities got together and worked in a unified fashion. "Are we failing to act?" he asked. "If so we are hastening absorption by Metro." He was given a standing ovation by members of County Council and the large contingent of visitors attending York County's 1961 inaugural.
Several men were nominated for the office of 1961 Warden. Included were Reeve Clarence Davis of Aurora; Reeve William Sellers of Sutton; Reeve Pollock of North Gwillimbury. All withdrew in favour of Reeve Joseph Fry of Markham Village, who therefore won an acclamation. A member of Markham Village Council for three years, he was then elected Reeve and this year is starting his tenth term in that office. He has been a resident of Markham for 32 years. It was the first time that Markham Village had won the County Wardenship since 1875-86 years ago.
The new Warden was sworn in by Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake. Flowers were presented to Mrs. Fry by Deputy Reeve Caroline Ion of Newmarket on behalf of County Council. Travelling bags were presented to retiring Warden Clark and Mrs. Clark.
A number of ex-Wardens of York County were present at the Inaugural meeting. All spoke briefly. Also present were Mayors James Haggart of Richmond Hill, Keith Nisbet of Aurora and James Otton of Newmarket, all of whom carried greetings to the County from their municipalities.
Traditional ceremonies marked the opening County meeting for 1961, with a Colour Party and Guard of Honour from the Queen's York Rangers, the County regiment, depositing the Queen's and Regimental Colours in the Council chamber.

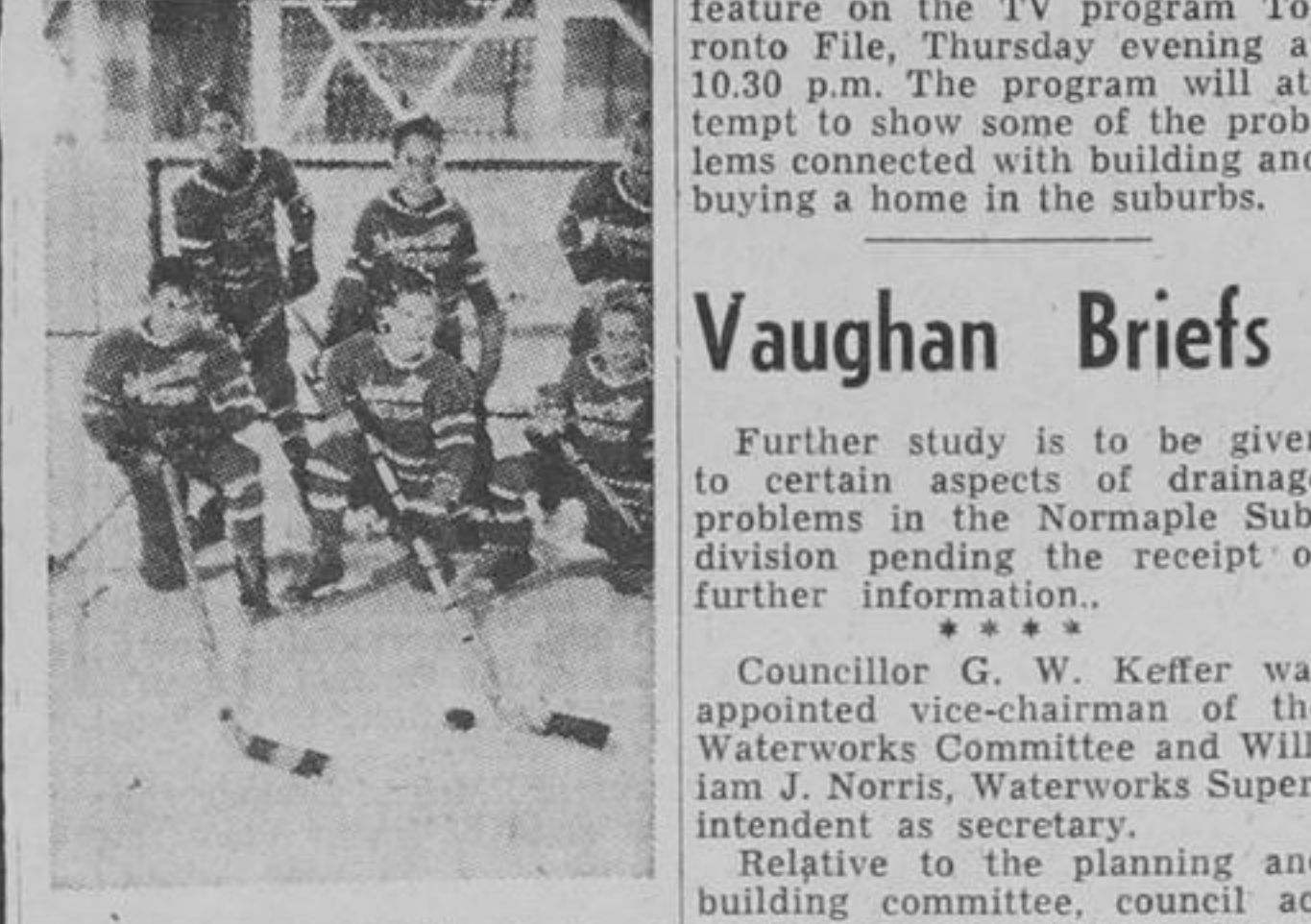
Film "Life In The Hill" C.B.C.T.V. "Comparison"
