York County Judge Frank McDonagh Was Speaker To Holy Name Society

Judge Frank McDonagh, Senior Judge of York County, was guest speaker when forty members of St. Mary's Holy Name Society, Richmond Hill, held their annual dinner meeting at the Richmond Grill and named officers for 1961-62. Dinner followed Holy Mass in St. Mary's Church.

Judge McDonagh pointed out that the Catholic faith, by its very nature, promotes good citizenship. Faith, morality and citizenship go together, he declared. A great challenge is put to men to protect them.

Two Dangers Seen

Vaughan Wants To Know If Water Is Available

Water supply for the Elgin Mills area formed the subject of a letter considered this week by Richmond Hill Town Council. 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Building Lots To Be 10,000 Feet Vaughan Twp. Council Will Insist

Vaughan Township Council on Monday went on record as being opposed to lots of less than 10,000 square feet in the long-proposed Maple Glen Subdivision just west of Maple. This move followed consideration of the contents of a copy of a letter sent by the developers to the Metropolitan Planning Board relative to the installation of sewers to service the proposed plan.

Messrs. Ralph Greenstein and Samuel Freedman of Toronto, the developers, originally looked to building approximately 30 homes on the 86-acre plot of land. In the light of new developments, they are seeking to arrange for a sewage disposal plant to replace the original septic tank plan. If they succeed in getting permission from Metro for the disposal plant, township officials feel they might have to reduce the area of the individual lots to build more homes to meet the cost of the sewage disposal plant.

Vaughan, in short, is anticipating a possible request for smaller lots and wants it clearly understood now it will require that the standard of development conform to present policy, namely 10,000 square foot lots, and the construction of no more than 50 homes per year.

Maple Glen had hoped to start work on the first five of the 200 homes this month. A month ago, draft approval prepared by the township and the principals had been pretty well worked out but was put aside to enable the principals to prove to the York County Health Unit that the drainage involved could be taken care of by a septic tank development. The health unit, by March 20, expressed a preference for a sewer disposal plant and since then the developers have been negotiating with Metro.

A Simple Way To Increase Your Car's Trade-In Value

Once in a while we take in a three to five-year-old used car from a new car buyer that has virtually no body rust despite the fact that it has been driven in all types of weather and parked outdoors overnight. An additional fact that is not generally known is that hot steam, used by many assembly line wash plants, will dull any car finish and ultimately cause flaking and rust spots. Automobile manufacturers' instructions clearly state that only luke warm or cold water should be used to preserve the finish on the new acrylic paints.

Another worthwhile suggestion is to have the attendant play his hose under the fenders for a few seconds to wash out accumulations of salt that continue to eat away at the inside of metal surfaces even after the car has been washed normally.
