Tennis Players To Bear Own Costs Precedent Dangerous, Says Council

"If adults seek to engage in recreation then adults should pay the full shot," asserted Mayor James Haggart at Monday evening's town council meeting when representatives of the Richmond Hill Tennis Club asked for municipal support of a tennis court extension. "We would be taking money from people who can't afford to join a club to help those who can," he declared. "If we granted this request then the curling club would have a right to ask for funds. Even the theatre, which also provides recreation, could ask for support."

Tennis club representatives explained the necessity of extending their courts and said that certain of their members had already made themselves personally responsible for financing to date. They asked council for an amount equal to whatever could be raised from members of the club. That would be impossible, they were told. Council couldn't issue a blank cheque and could

not budget on that basis. Asked to state what amount would be required, the club's representatives named \$1,500. It was pointed out that the club already owed the town \$525.
Club Said Asset
The club was an asset to the town, said Mr. Kai Holbek, who spoke for it. "Where you have evidence to support a claim you should put it in to the recreation committee," he said. "That had been done, he said, but a grant of \$200. had been refused as the recreation committee felt that it could not make a capital grant."
Councillor Al White declared that the Mayor was quite right in his stand that those wishing for facilities should pay for them. "When we needed lights in the park we had to pay for them ourselves," he said. "The people in the figure skating club pay their own way," said the Mayor. "Boys in the hockey club pay \$10 a season," said Councillor Mrs. Margaret Southwell.
Can Play For 50 Cents
"If these were municipal courts could my kid go down and play?" asked Councillor White. He could, said Mr. Holbek. An arrangement had been made whereby any person could play on payment of a 50 cent fee each time. Council failed to take any action on the request. Mr. Holbek was admonished by Mr. Francis Redmeier.

Lots To Be Policed

Parking Meters To Cover Longer Mileage On Yonge

Two-hour free parking on off-street parking lots was suggested to town council in a letter received from the Richmond Hill Parking Authority. Policing by town police was also suggested to prevent indiscriminate all-day parking by those working in the downtown area. All members of council except Councillor Tom Broadhurst agreed. He claimed that the present arrangement was "disguised financing."
Mayor Haggart and others disagreed. "We are in a transitional period," said Deputy-reeve Bradstock. He pointed out that the Authority started with no funds at all. "We might have to de-benture," he claimed.
Policing Needed
Policing of the parking lot at Yonge and Richmond Streets was good business, said Mayor Haggart. There have been many complaints that the lot, designed to accommodate shoppers, is being used as an all-day parking place by down-town people and its original purpose is being defeated. Preparation of a covering by-law was discussed.
Councillor Mrs. Southwell asked if police had time to check matters. It was reported that they had. "Then it's a pity that we don't see them on Yonge Street sometimes," said Councillor Al White.
To Extend Meters
Installation of meters to cover all Yonge Street was approved and a covering by-law passed.

Meters will be installed on both sides of Yonge from a point 375 feet north of the Markham and Vaughan Roads. On the east they will extend to the south corner of Crosby Avenue. On the west they will go as far as the south corner of Benson Avenue.
On the objection of Councillor Broadhurst the time of payment of parking tickets, originally set at 48 hours, was extended to five days. An effort to have on-street parking extended to two hours was rejected by a majority of council.

Royal Commission Study Proposed For Present Ontario County Plan

"The position of the County in Ontario" will be the theme at the annual conference of the town and village section of the Ontario Municipal Association, to be held at Renfrew on May 12th and 13th, Richmond Hill Town Council learned at its regular meeting this week.
A resolution to be presented and voted on at the Renfrew Conference suggests that the provincial government be asked to appoint a Royal Commission to investigate the composition, selection, function and boundaries of counties and county councils; changes needed in boundaries to take present needs into proper consideration; studies of the comparable cost of administrative functions and efficiency of county administration; amendment to the Municipal Act which are needed.
An endeavour will be made to have the reeve and/or deputy-reeve, the town's representatives on county council, attend the conference.

3 Hill Residents Seriously Injured

Three Richmond Hill residents are in Branson Hospital following a two-car collision at the corner of Markham Road and Yonge Street at 3:10 a.m. Sunday which resulted in \$1,100 damages to both vehicles. Police say that a charge of failing to stop for a red light will be laid against J. Crooks of Wood Lane, driver of one of the cars. Crooks sustained bruised abdominal muscles and bruises to his face.
The other victims were Mr. and Mrs. Carl Melanson of Alper Street. Mr. Melanson suffered concussion, a six-inch laceration to his scalp and bruises to his left forearm and chest. Mrs. Melanson sustained concussion, a cut over the left eye, back injuries and bruises to her right knee, hand and shoulder.
According to police, the accident occurred when the Crooks car, going south on Yonge Street, struck the left rear section of the Melanson vehicle which was proceeding east on Markham Road.
