Fit The Shoe To The Foot (2nd of 2 Articles)

Fashion has so ruled footwear that the list of faults is bewilderingly long. They are most obvious in women's shoes but some men's shoes are inadequate also. (a) Sufficient room for action

is an essential in the front of the shoe. (b) Lack of height through the vamp is one of the commonest and most per-

-nicious faults in shoes. (c) The sharp-toed shoe has a tendency to crowd the toes if it lacks length. If adequate length is provided, the sharp angle at the point does not necesarily cramp the toes but in most instances, the obliquity from the sharp point cuts off the length of the last and the toe space is cramped.

A good shoe must be long enough, wide enough, of proper vamp height, correctly shaped, adequately supported at the heel and in the shank.
