Dr. Quentin Hardy estimated last week that patients of King City area receive about 50 pints of blood a year.

In 1947 the Canadian Red Cross Society organized the world's first nation-wide free blood transfusion service. Blood received from donors is available without charge when needed by patients.

Blood which has not been used in a limited time is processed into life-giving plasma, which is also supplied without charge to those who require it.

The collecting, grouping, cross-matching and distribution of
