"Destination - Asia!" Bound for Colombo, in Ceylon, by air and by sea, Miss Grethe Dahl of Richmond Street, last night (August 16th) flew from Malton Airport to London, England by BOAC Britannia plane. From London, aboard the Peninsular & Orient Liner "Acadia", Miss Dahl will proceed to Colombo, traversing the Atlantic Ocean, through the Straits of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean Sea. At Port Said, Egypt, the ship through the Suez Canal will commence, then, at the canal's southern end out into the Red Sea, and after a stop at the port of Aden, across the Arabian Sea to Colombo, situated on the southern tip of the island of Ceylon, off the most southern point of India, and just north of the Equator.

Miss Dahl is a member of the Canadian Overseas Volunteer Group, being one of the ten Canadian university graduates selected from the University of Toronto to serve as volunteer technicians in the less developed regions of the world. Funeral Service For Fire Victim

High requiem mass was held yesterday at 9 a.m. at St. Mary's Immaculate Catholic Church, Richmond Hill, for J. Earl Tansy, 66, who perished in the August 13 fire which destroyed the \$20,000 Del Brocco Co. Ltd. building on Keele Street, Maple. Rev. F. McGinn officiated and interment was in Holy Cross Cemetery.

Efforts to locate a brother, believed living somewhere in Texas, and a sister in Chicago, have so far been unavailing. The remains rested at the Wright and Taylor Funeral Home, Richmond Hill. The fire broke out about 3 a.m. Firemen from Maple and Richvale were unable to bring it under control because of its advanced state. The building, which contained the contracting firm's offices, was 1 1/2 miles north of No. 7 Highway and contained an apartment occupied by Mr. Tansy. The fire victim, a retired lawyer, was found in his bed three hours after the outbreak occurred. He had succumbed to smoke.

At 5 a.m. the Maple Fire Department responded to a call a quarter of a mile south on Keele Street where flames destroyed a 200-year-old barn. The barn is believed to have been constructed in the eighteenth century. In 1943 a fire wiped out another large barn on the same property. The barn destroyed on August 13 had been brought to the property, re-assembled and improved.

Prominent Businessman W.J. Hall Dies Suddenly

The sudden passing of Mr. I. While William Hall was over 77 years, on Wednesday evening, August 9th, in Toronto, Ontario. Following his return from World War I, William Hall joined his father in operating the Richmond Hill farm for a while. Experienced in the operation of dairies, both before and after going overseas, in 1927 he formed Hall's Pure Milk Dairy Ltd., in Toronto.

During Mr. Hall's many successful years in business, he gained the esteem and admiration of all his associates. In 1940, he bought his father's farm in Richmond Hill and he and his family lived there for three years. In 1958 he sold his dairy business and retired. Mr. and Mrs. Hall then moved to Richmond Hill, spending their time between their home here and their cottage on Sparrow Lake. For many years they were members of Carman Memorial United Church, Toronto.

The late Mr. Hall is survived by his wife, Mrs. Eva M. Hall, and by his mother, Mrs. Martha Jane Hall, who, aged 95 years, is extremely active and visits Richmond Hill. A son and a daughter surviving are: Mr. Jack Hall, Fort Lauderdale, Florida, and Mrs. W. Gall of Burlington, Ontario. Brothers and sisters are Mr. Ernest Hall, Mr. Alfred Hall, Mrs. A. McKay, Mrs. P. Large, Mrs. H. Reid, Mrs. E. Gamble, Mrs. T. Murphy and Mrs. D. Goulding. Rev. F. W. Bralley of the Carman Memorial United Church officiated at the service held in the Wright & Taylor Chapel of the Pipher Funeral Home, Richmond Hill, with interment of the late Mr. William Hall in Parklawn Cemetery, Toronto. The pallbearers were Messrs. Lloyd Reid, Peter Large, Jack Hall, George Goulding, Bob Hall and Barry Hall.

Early Morning Accident Fatal

An early-morning two-car crash on No. 11 Highway just south of Oak Ridges on August 14, resulted in the death of Bernard Waters, 30, Bayview Avenue, Richmond Hill and sent three others to hospital with serious injuries. The accident occurred at 1 a.m. when the car driven by Waters, travelling north toward Aurora, was struck by a vehicle driven by Donald Goulding, 24, of Toronto. According to Mr. Bill Waters, a brother of the crash victim who identified the body at 2.30 a.m. at York County Hospital, Newmarket, it appeared that the Goulding vehicle, going south, slewed sideways across the four-lane highway, striking the Water's car broadside. Goulding is in hospital with a fractured skull, jaw and leg. His wife, Barbara, 27, suffered leg cuts.
