Financially the Zeros are still in the swaddling stage. One big reason for the shaky financial structure is the lack of fan support. In Fergus, Alliston, Huntsville and other towns around the circuit a crowd of 300 is common. A big crowd at a lacrosse game in Richmond Hill is about 150 people.

Why the difference? Heaven alone knows the answer. Loyal fans that do attend games are treated to some really great lacrosse playing. Admittedly it wasn't always the case and the Zeros of a few weeks past weren't providing too much opposition. Those times are past and gone. The Zeros in their present form can play lacrosse with the best of them. Teams that like to play it rough find the Zeros ready, willing and able. Nobody is a "chicken" on this club. If opponents want it hot and fast the Zeros can match them stride for stride and shot for shot. What else does a good lacrosse team need to be a success?

Players are literally financing their own way on all counts. Some players provide transportation for other players on out of town trips and never get a dime for gas money. Sure they love to play lacrosse and would gladly pay and are paying to play the game. Quite often club officials are more than a little embarrassed when, after the referees are paid, there just isn't money to reimburse a player for the \$5 or \$10 worth of gasoline he has contributed to the cause.

Gate receipts are split with the Arena Association on a mutually agreeable basis. Thanks to the generous terms granted by the association the lacrosse team is still slightly solvent but only just.

Here in Richmond Hill we are proud, and rightly so, of our rose industry and we take great civic pride in letting everyone know about it. We are fast gathering a reputation as being one of the real hotbeds of softball in Ontario and a lot of us are proud of that, again rightly so. With a little spectator support Richmond Hill could mean something in the lacrosse world as well.

Maybe it's already too late for this year but club executives are looking forward to a busy fall and winter season in a drive to raise funds for next year. They won't be asking for handouts or charity in any form but will provide entertainment value for monies received. Plans are afoot to hold winter and spring dances and one or two other little deals that will jell later. Could be that next year might be an entirely different story.
