It was almost like old times on Yonge Street in Richmond Hill last Monday - "old times" in this case meaning prior to the construction of No. 400 Highway - the Barrie and points north road.

Essex Ave. Residents Ask Removal Of Shacks

Dealing with a petition signed by 38 persons, which asked that steps should be taken to improve conditions of land on Essex Avenue, Richmond Hill, Mayor James Haggart pointed out that the municipality is restricted in its powers of entering on to private property.

There must be a statutory reason, he said, such as weeds or a menace to health.

The Essex Avenue petitioners asked the town to remove shacks on a property and to cut down weeds. A report from the fire chief said that he had inspected the property. Doors were locked and windows boarded. The structures were sound. Roofing paper covering walls had been removed by children. Weeds on the property were in need of cutting.

Council agreed that the works department would see to the weeds and that the owners will be written regarding the shacks.

Attending from the Hill with Dr. Mackay were Don Little, president; Walter Sleeman, secretary, and Pete Dyson, treasurer.

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
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
