# Driver Gets Eight Days

# 4-Car Crash On Yonge Brings Injuries To Eight

A four-car crash at Markham homes Road and Yonge Street, Richmond Hill, at 7.45 p.m. September 23, resulted in injuries to eight persons including a mother and her three children, total damages to the vehicles estimated at more than \$2,500 and an eight-day prison term for the Toronto driver responsible for the accident.

According to police, Herbert McLeod, 19, Toronto, going south on Yonge, crashed into the rear of a vehicle driven by Co. Doll, 22, of Aurora. The Dol car was catapulted forward, striking the rear of a car driven by Bruce Fenwick, 17, of the Hill. It then went out of control and struck a third car head on.

This vehicle was owned by Louis Peters, Toronto, and driven by Ross Breuls, of Richmond Hill, at the office; one officer was injured were Mrs. Louis Peters, 4, and Frank Pe- ters, 27, scraped wrist and leg; Brian Peters, 4, and Frank Pe- ters, 3, bruises and shock; Her- bert McLeod, leg and arm cuts and abrasions to the right arm; Ross Breuls, leg cut and minor bruises; Co. 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# Transport Dept. Explains Change Of Amber, Green, Traffic Lights

A Department of Transport spokesman says that there appears to be some confusion among motorists as to the implications of the change in colour sequence of traffic lights.

He said that the reason for the abolition of the Amber/Green combination following the green light and the institution of the sequence of "Red to Green to Amber to Red" was to bring Ontario's traffic lights into line with recommended standards for such devices. The change of colour sequence is required to take exactly the same action when the amber light is showing alone.

Continuing, he said that after December 31 this year all traffic lights in Ontario would have to conform to the standard sequence of the green and amber lights. The change in the system of the green and amber lights simultaneously may be encountered.

Concluding he said, "Under the provisions of the Demerit Point System a motorist convicted of failing to obey a signal-light receives 3 points."

Speaking on the required action by motorists due to the change, the Department spokesman said, "Previously when a motorist approached an intersection controlled by a traffic light and the amber and green lights were showing simultane- ously, he was required to bring his vehicle to a full stop unless it would be hazardous to do so, in which case he could proceed with caution. Today the motor-

ist is required to take exactly the same action when the amber light is showing alone. Continuing, he said that after December 31 this year all traffic lights in Ontario would have to conform to the standard sequence of the green and amber lights.
