Councillor Whillans as the latter continued to object to "discrimination" and claimed that the arrangement would be more than temporary. Councillor Al. White was strongly in favour of supplying Elgin Mills by whatever system was thought best by Vaughan Township. Councillor Mrs. Southwell pointed out that it would be unreasonable to charge a higher rate as those using the water would be put to considerable inconvenience in getting it. It would not be like turning on a tap and having the water flow.

Mayor Visits Vaughan

On conclusion of the Richmond Hill meeting, Mayor Haggart went to Maple to tell Vaughan councillors of his council's decision. The latter, still in session, told him that they had instructed officials to take immediate steps to study the need and the system which might be employed. They expressed appreciation of Richmond Hill's co-operation.

Both Mayor Haggart and members of Vaughan's council stressed that speedy action would be taken. Resolutions of both councils left the door open for supply of water to Elgin Mills, in whatever manner was decided on, as soon as plans were made.

Mr. N. Davison, principal, introduced the teaching staff, beginning with the original seven teachers who have been at Walter Scott, since it opened. He explained these were seven of the original 12 teachers, including three who are new to the school this year.

Mr. John Wheeler gave a brief outline of the safety patrol, informing parents that crossing guards are on duty at main intersections at all regular times for going to or from school.

Mr. Matthews, Grade 7 teacher, who took six weeks of his vacation to take a physical education course, outlined the importance of the P. E. program in school for physical development and encouragement of leadership qualities.

Mr. John Peace, Grade 8 teacher, and vice-principal, explained the rotary system now used. Grades 7 and 8 move from their classrooms every afternoon for five subjects. This enables pupils to experience a high school procedure in a familiar setting, and gives them the benefit of more specialized teaching. The five teachers meet once a week to discuss homework projects and exchange opinions on individual children. Thus the pupils have the benefit of the experience of five teachers, instead of one. Grades 5 and 6 have a partial rotary system, with music, art, p.e. and health.

The meeting ended with a social half hour, with refreshments provided by the executive.
