



LIFE IN THE HILL

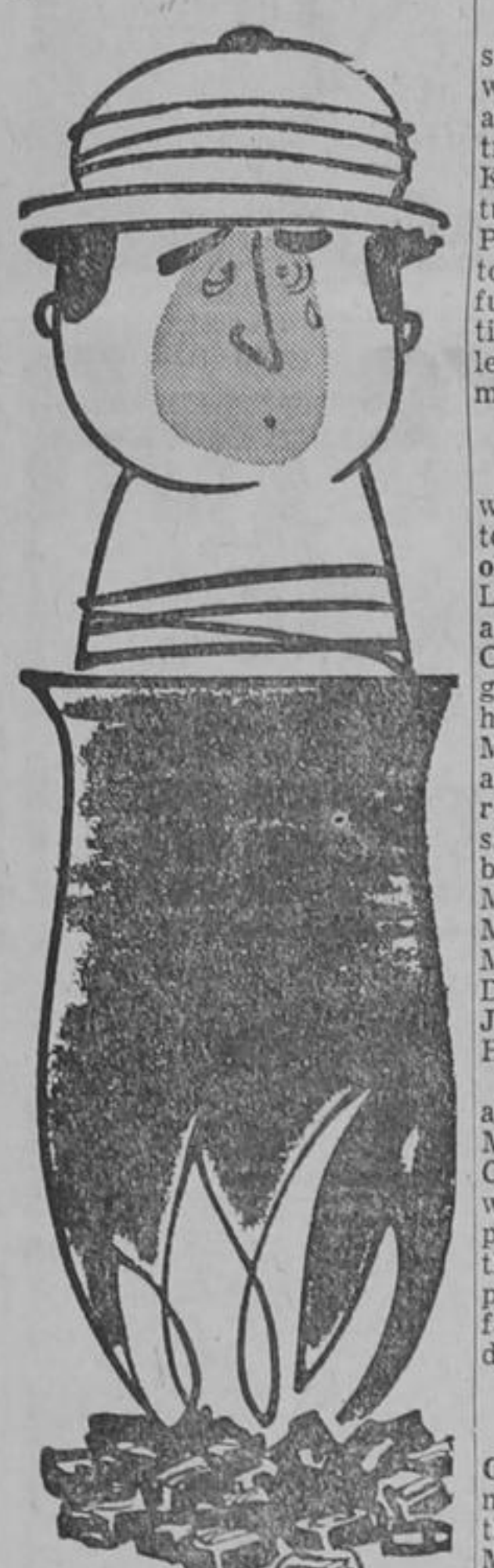
