First Anniversary Is Observed By Baptist Church Congregation

A year of service in Richmond Hill was marked last Sunday when St. John's Baptist Church marked its first anniversary. The first service was held a year ago in Pleasantville Public School with Dr. H. U. Trilner as minister.

During the year the congregation has grown and has changed its place of meeting to the auditorium of MacKillop Public School. For his sermon on Sunday morning the present minister, the Rev. John Ward, chose the theme "Everyone a Prophet." Since it was also Laymen's Sunday the scripture was read by Mr. Jim Loney and the prayer was offered by Mr. John Burton. Resolution To Govern Housing Developments Instead Of New Bylaw

A resolution instead of a bylaw will cover the new arrangement by which developers of residential subdivisions will be required to provide a certain proportion of industrial assessment, it was agreed by Richmond Hill Town Council this week.

Decision to make this a fixed policy was unanimous. The resolution is now being prepared and after it has been passed by council, copies will be given to all persons proposing residential development in Richmond Hill. Its passage at an early date is expected.
