Duck Season Opening Successful

Excellent weather prevailed for the opening of the duck season in the Lake Simcoe District at noon Saturday, October 7th. Main duck marshes, in the district, were patrolled by all available Department of Lands and Forests staff situated on access roads and hunters were co-operative in supplying Department personnel with information requested and donating wings from birds as they were checked, for identification purposes.

Although completed figures are not yet available, it would appear from early reports, that more hunters were present in the Holland Marsh than last year. Reports also indicated that hunters' success was higher with blacks, mallards and teal making up most of the bag. Some pintail, woodduck, ring neck and bluebills were also recorded.

There were a few infractions of the Game and Fisheries Act and some firearms were seized by Department conservation officers and the R.C.M.P. According to Senior Conservation Officer Bob Trotter seizures were approximately the same as in the season opening in 1960.
