Property Protection Equalized Treatment Emphasized By Board

Termining the enterprise a worthy one, members of the public school board expressed regret at their last meeting when they turned down a request for the loan of a 16 mm projector for the showing of films at the public library on Saturdays. The project is run by two residents who take a special interest in seeing that the town's youngsters have an opportunity of viewing films which are not available commercially.

The board has been faced with requests for loan of school equipment in the past and, as a matter of policy in order to protect the property of taxpayers, has refused to let it leave school premises. In this case, it was pointed out, the projector was simply for use as a spare. Board members felt that if material was refused to one group it should be refused to all and consequently turned down the request.

Meeting Of Board, Council, Jefferson Parents Hangs Fire As Bus Arrangement Nears Finish

Business Administrator, Norman Jackman, reported to the Vaughan Township School Board at their October Meeting that "Council is arranging a meeting between the board, the school board, and parents of the Jefferson school children, who are struggling to have the board reinstate the school bus serving the Yonge Street area. The bus, which is being provided by well-wishers in the interest of the children's safety, will run until October 15, only six days from the date of the meeting. This report was in answer to a question by Vice-Chairman, Mona Robertson.

Present at the meeting were Trustees Goodwin and Kerr, with the vice-chairman presiding.

A letter from Principal John Martin of the Thornhill Public School, requested addition of school crossing signs on No. 7 Highway, as a protection for the children who must cross this busy thoroughfare to walk on the sidewalk provided on the south side of the road. A letter from the Department of Highway Engineering in this request, recommending that the signs be placed, one facing east, west of Oakbank, and one facing west,

west of Eureka Road. Request Speed Limit Richvale Home and School requested the board's assistance in having a 30-mile speed limit declared on the east-west roads in that area. Principal Kurita explained that illegal 30 m.p.h. signs have been erected on these roads, but it is impossible for the police to prosecute offenders. The letter was referred to the township council for action in the matter.

Superintendent Joseph Gibson presented a detailed report on enrollment as of the last day of September, 1961. Total enrollment was 2,985, down slightly from the high of a year ago due to the removal of 60 pupils from the township of Markham from area schools. By grades, the report shows 278 pupils in kindergarten, 414 in grade 1, 348 in grade 2, 336 in grade 3, 346 in grade 4, 339 in grade 5, 301 in grade 6, 202 in grade 7, 294 in grade 8. Special classes take care of 37 pupils.

Charles Howitt School has an enrollment of 387, Concord 181, George Bailey 354, Hope 54, Jefferson 126, Langstaff 324, Patterson 29, Powell Road 142, Richvale 143, Ross Doan 229, and Thornhill 357.

"The transportation policy has been fully implemented," said Mr. Gibson, "with six bus routes transporting all children who live more than two miles from school."

He also reported that classes conducted by Mr. George Green, principal of the Edgeley School, are being held at the Villa Private Hospital where five young wheel-chair patients are continuing their studies in grades 6, 7, 8. The classes are held after regular school hours twice a week for a total of 150 minutes. This programme has been approved by the Department of Education, which have allowed five home instruction units for the School area. Later Mr. Gibson explained that each unit is counted as one pupil a day for grant purposes.

The vice-chairman pointed out that such a service would have been impossible without a school area board.

The report of the property committee presented by its chairman, Trustee Harold Goodwin, recommended that the Brethren in Christ Church, now a holding Sunday School services in the Concord Public School, be permitted to continue using the room is now used as a playroom.

It was suggested that clubs arrange for broadcasts of meetings and all were urged to vote right for those who will support the S. C.

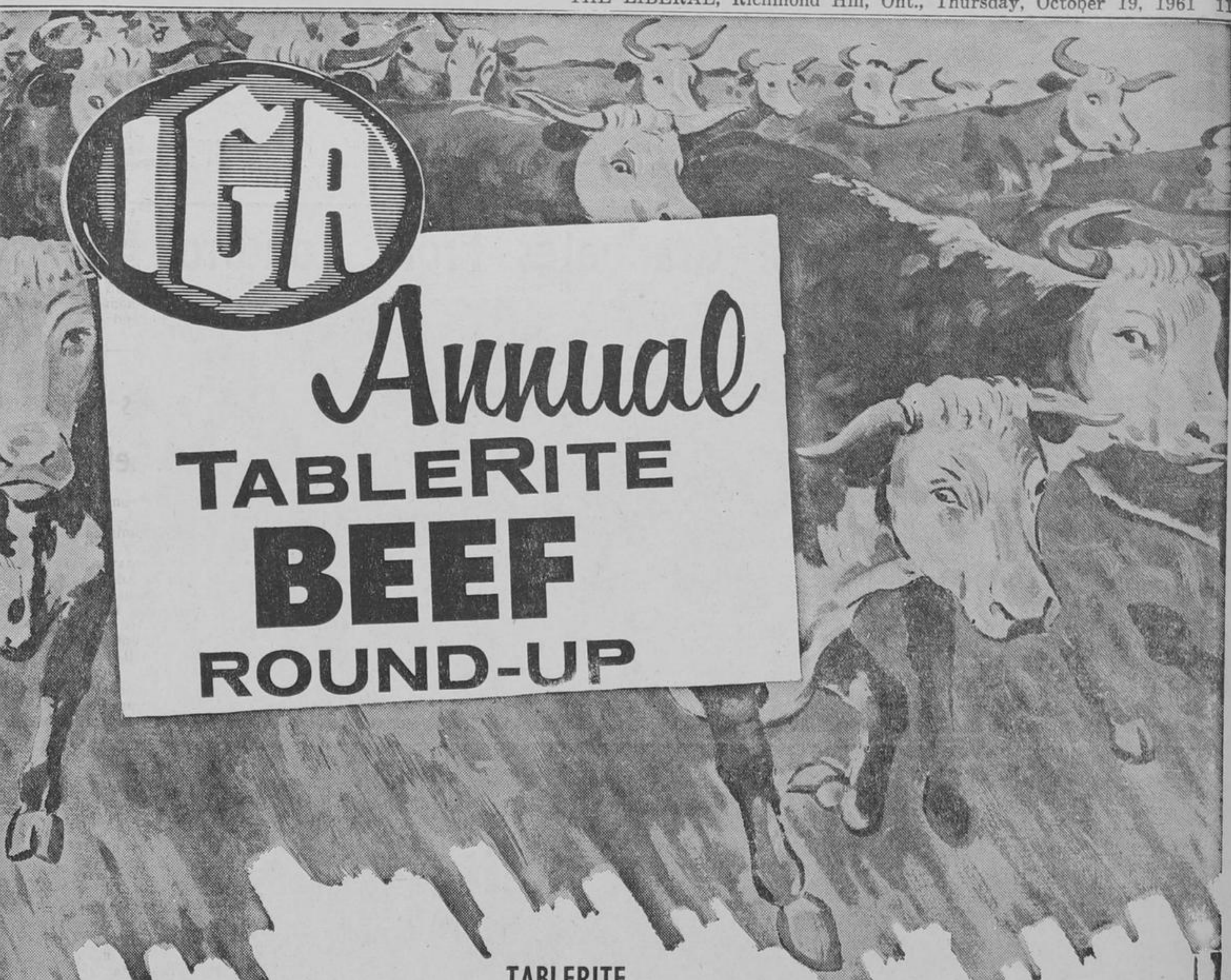
Mrs. F. C. Jackson once again congratulated the members on their election of officers and interesting activities.

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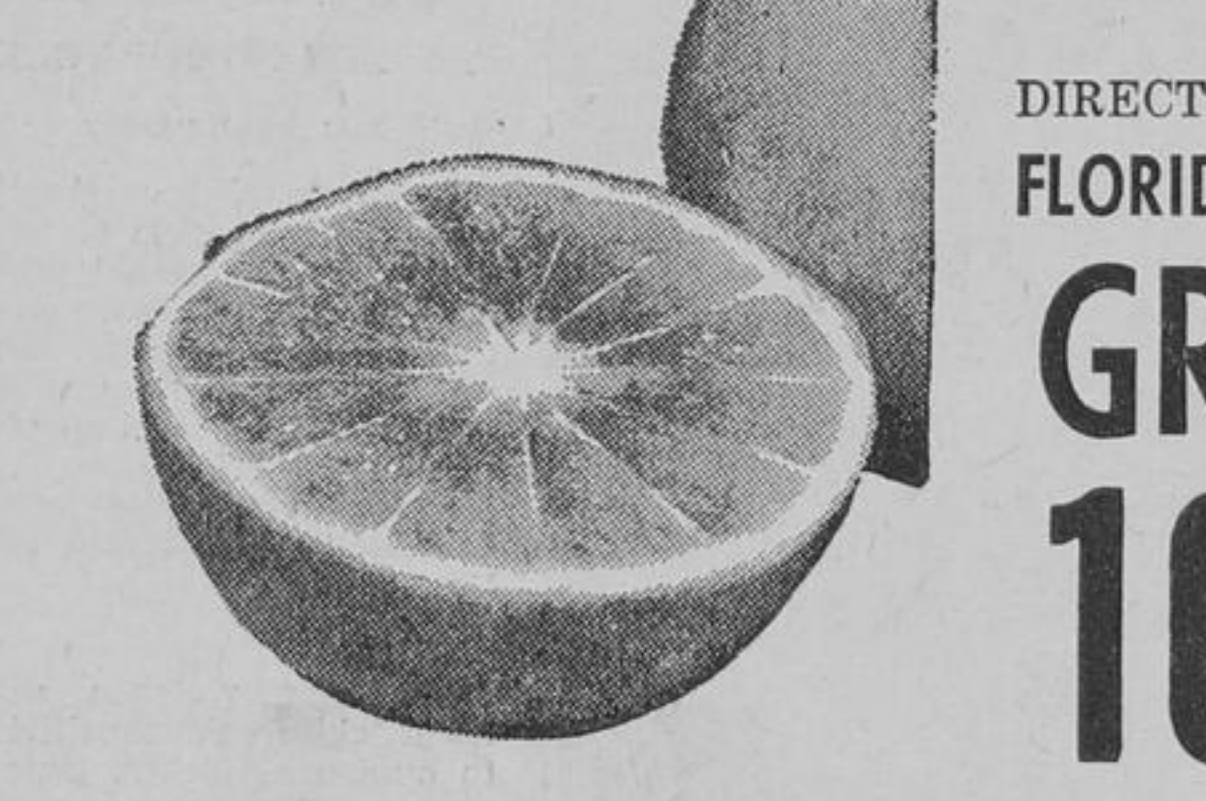
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
