**Nature Notes**

By Richmond Hill Naturalists

The fall has been a busy one for many naturalists. Possibly the busiest place has been the home of John and Gwen Lunn on Wedrick Ave. To date, they have banded around 1600 birds. The peak day was 102. Due to this extensive bird-banding they have been able to add earlier records for spring migration arrivals and later fall departures for this area. Of the migratory birds that stayed to feed for a day or more they think they have banded from 50 to 75%. They have had many surprises: the bigger ones were two ruffed grouse, eight saw-whet owls and a sparrow hawk. There were two sparrows in the mist net and they believe that was what caused the sparrow hawk to swoop down. On October 15th they noted that most of the warblers had left. Myrtle warblers are still around. A banded black-throated blue warbler left on the 11th after staying three days, feeding in their garden. They banded 78 on the 15th of which 49 were juncoes, a first fall banding of a tree sparrow and two rusty blackbirds.

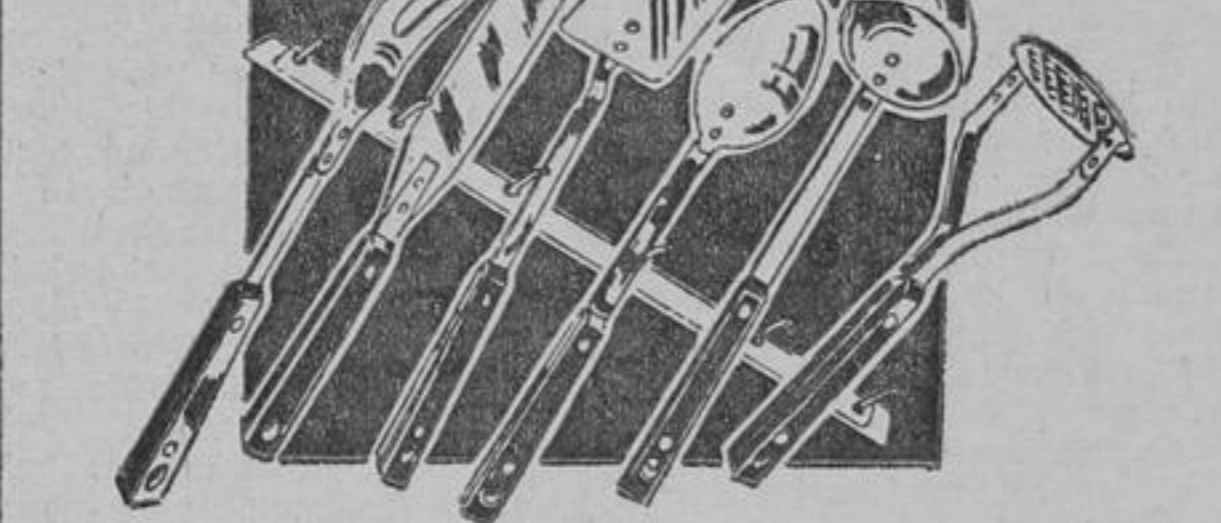
