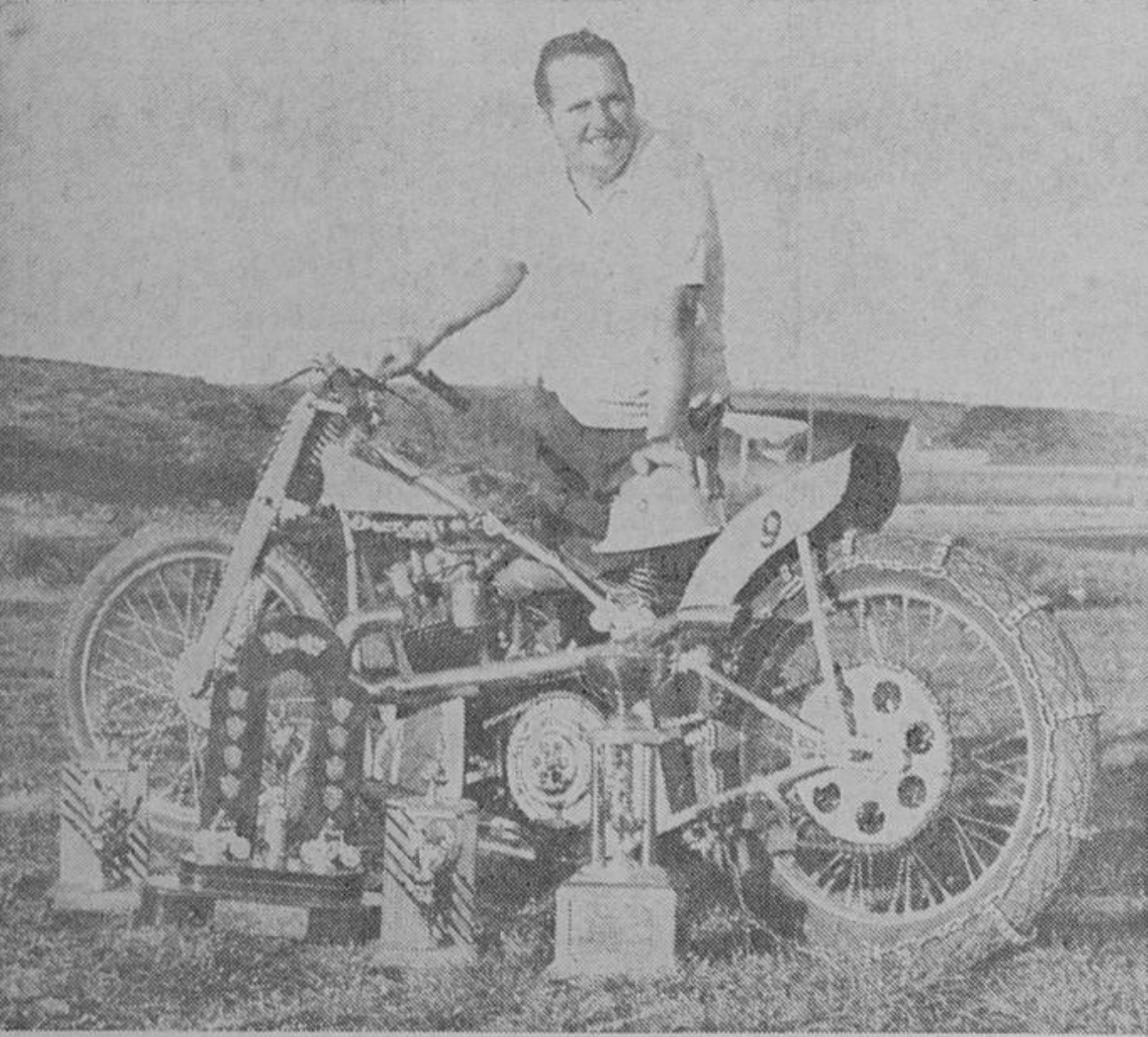

## Maple Man Brings Trophy Back



A resident of Maple swept the decks at Heidelberg, near Kitchener, on Thanksgiving Day, at the motorcycle hill-climbing competition sanctioned by the Canadian Motorcycle Association. Ken Hutton won the William Schoeneich Memorial Trophy, bringing it back to Canada for the first time since he had previously won it in 1957. This was the third time he had captured it. He also won the Mel Weber Trophy for the fastest run of the day, his time being 4.41 seconds for the nearly 200-foot hill. Altogether Hutton has won 36 motorcycle trophies.

## Maple United Church Observes 70th Anniversary Of The W. M. Society

Visitors from neighboring churches, former members and friends were present. A number of letters of congratulations were received from former members also some sending regrets of not being able to be present because of poor health or too great distance.  
The president, Mrs. T. F. Jackson opened the meeting with a warm welcome to all those present.  
Mrs. E. Hemphill gave a very inspiring devotional, "Watch ye, Stand Firm In The Faith," based on Paul's letter to the church in Corinth.  
Two lovely solos, "The Ninety and Nine" and "Hear Ye," were sung by Mrs. N. Garriock, of Woodbridge and accompanied by Mrs. R. Clegg at the organ.  
The guest speaker was Mrs. R. P. Lowery, Christian Stewardship Secretary from the Dominion Board of the United Church. She congratulated the Maple W.M.S. on their 70 years accomplishments which would prove a great heritage, yet there is still much to do.  
**Love Should Be Basis**  
Mrs. Lowery said, Love should be the basis of all we do; it is our greatest privilege. We should read and study more books on Christian Stewardship. If we would see Love and Faith in action, we must rely on constant and intense prayer. We cannot be thoughtful if we do not give. A very appropriate message at this Thanksgiving time of year.  
Mrs. Dorey, also from the Dominion Board, read one of her poems, "The Thrill of Giving."  
Everyone was invited to stay for refreshments and a social time in the religious education room.  
At the tea table, Mrs. W. Hodgson, president of York Presbyterian and Dr. Arkinfall, past president, poured tea. A dainty lunch was served with the W.M.S. president Mr. Jackson cutting the anniversary cake, donated by Mrs. E. Hemphill.

Smith; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. T. Oliver; Recording Secretary, Mrs. G. Cook; Treasurer, Mrs. J. Oliver. 13 members enrolled and the first allocation was \$54.00. Tribute was paid to those faithful ladies, along with many others, very familiar to many in this district, who are no longer with us. Faithful and outstanding service has been given by the ladies down through the 70 years of the W.M.S.  
Many quilts and layettes have been made or donated, other sewing done and clothing collected and used towards the welfare of others. Mrs. Harry Jennings has been in charge of supply work for many years.  
Following the 70 years of service this meeting brought to a close the Maple United Church W. M. S. and W. A. as separate auxiliaries.

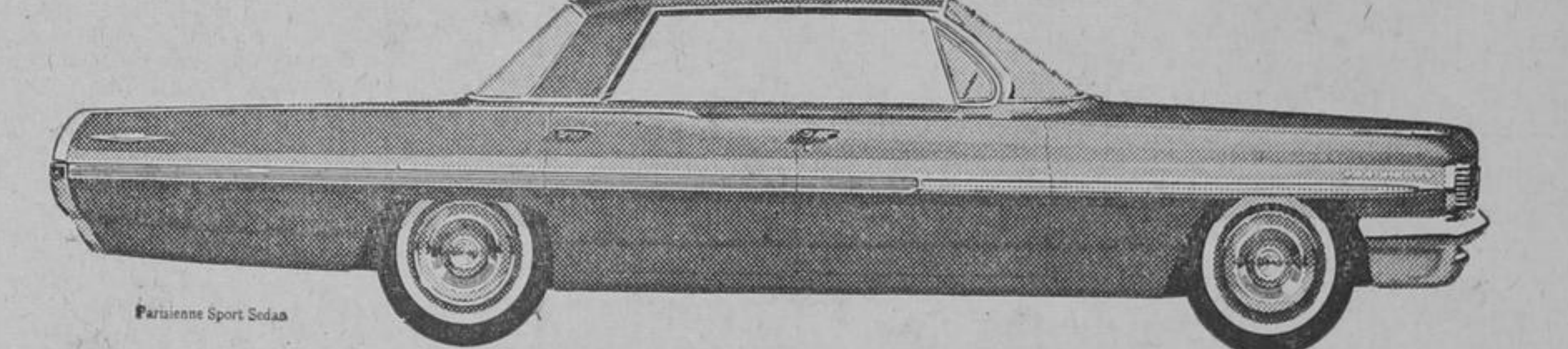
