strator at \$9,500 yearly, in addition to other staff receiving \$8,610.

"How much supervising do you need?" asked Mrs. James. She said that the suggestion for the hiring of a superintendent had been presented in a private meeting. It had been understood that a representative from the department of education would visit the board and give information. This department refused to do, claiming that it was up to the board to make its own decision first.

"New Wrinkle"

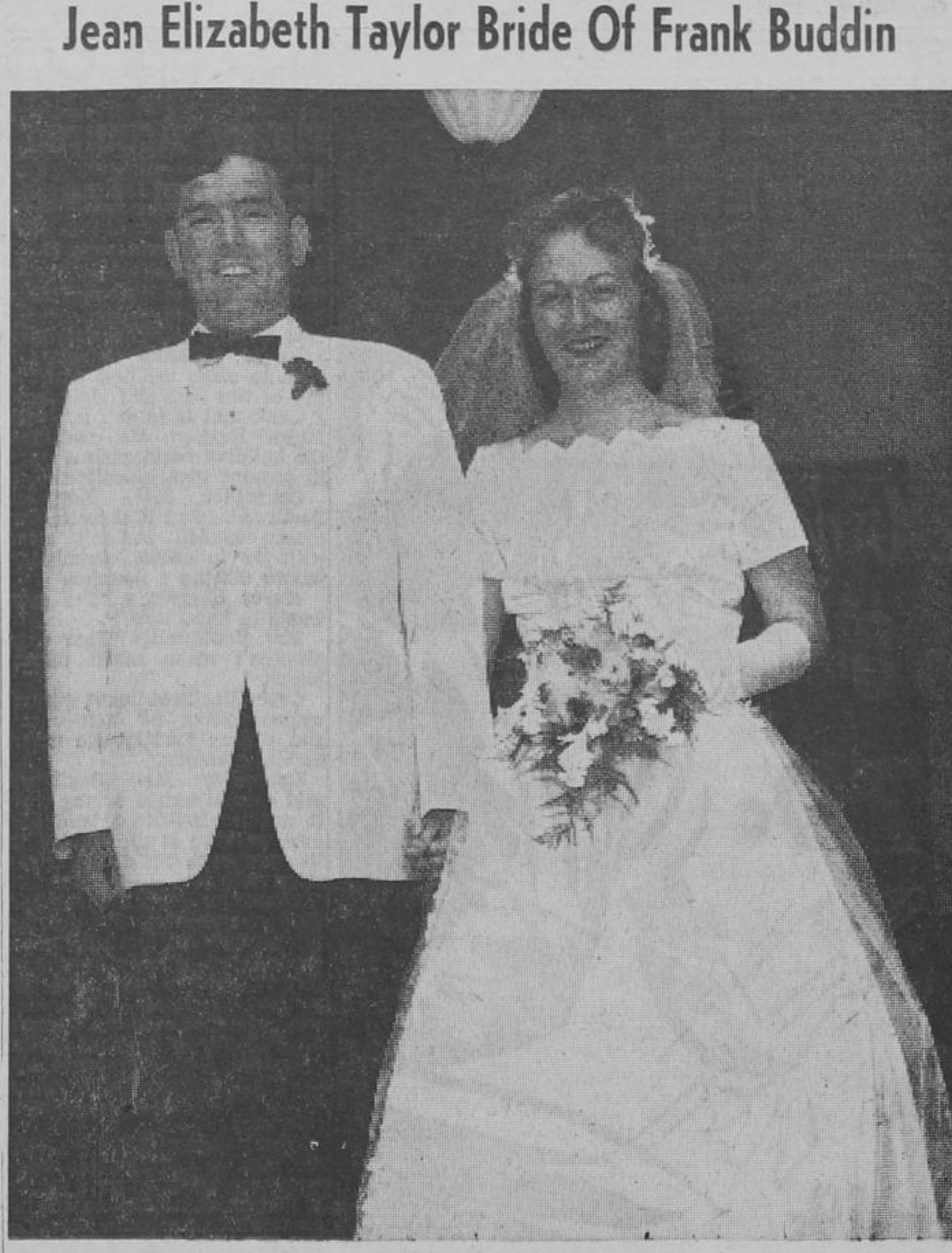
As for the percentage comparisons given by Mr. Axelsson, this was a "new wrinkle," Mrs. James said. "We shouldn't have to repeat the mistakes of other boards." Dealing with the routine of the appointment, she said that the vote to hire a superintendent was to be effective in September 1962. Yet, she said, an advertisement appeared on October 14 with closing date for applications to be November 3rd, and applications for the position were to be screened that very night, October 23rd.

Honsberger Letter

A letter from Trustee J. Honsberger, who was in favour of the appointment of a superintendent but who was unable to attend council meeting, was read. It repeated, in general, the comments made by Trustee Axelsson. On a query by Reeve Dean, Mr. Axelsson admitted that a statement in the Honsberger letter to the effect that a superintendent was mandatory when 150 teachers were employed was wrong.

"Can we do anything about this now?" asked Councillor Hooper. "It should be reopened," declared Mrs. James. "Council will have to take hard steps on these school boards," asserted Mr. Hooper. "They are in too big a hurry. If this man is not use we should be able to criticize. We sit here trying to save. The taxpayers should be given more consideration. Is this just making a soft job for somebody?"

Reeve Dean concluded the lengthy session of school matters by asserting that a statement that he had made to the press — that the appointment of a superintendent was premature — still stood.
