

TAKE NOTICE THAT

- (1) The council of the Corporation of the Township of Markham intends to construct as a local improvement
 - (a) establishment, grading and improving a 66 foot street between Lots 29 and 30 in Concession 1 of the Township of Markham, the south half of the said allowance will comprise thirty-three feet of Registered Plan 8 in Lot 29; the north half, thirty-three feet of Registered Plan 3537 in Lot 30. The westerly limit of the new road will be the southward production of the line between Lots 2 and 3, Registered Plan 3537. The easterly limit will be the southward production of the line between Lots 19 and 20, Registered Plan 3537. The total length of the new work is some 1,257 feet more or less
 - (b) construction of a watermain and sanitary sewer, together with service connections, on the new street
 and intends to specially assess the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work.
- (2) (a) The estimated cost of the roadwork is \$30,475.00 of which no portion is to be paid by the Corporation. The estimated cost per foot frontage is \$14.96. The special assessment is to be paid in 10 equal annual instalments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is \$2,033.
- (b) The estimated cost for the sewers and watermains, including service connections, is \$22,525.00 of which no portion is to be paid by the Corporation. The estimated cost per foot frontage is \$11.08. The special assessment is to be paid in 20 equal annual instalments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is \$0.966.
- (3) Application will be made by the Corporation to the Ontario Municipal Board for its approval of the undertaking of the work and any other may within 21 days after the first publication of this notice file with the Board his objection to the work being undertaken.
- (4) The Board may approve of the work being undertaken, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objections to the work will be considered.

Bayview Making Academic History, Says Speaker



Vice-Chairman J. Wilson of the York Central District High School Board (seen above) acted as chairman of the first commencement at the new Bayview High School held Friday evening of last week. In his address Mr. Wilson was highly critical of those opposing the proposed appointment of a superintendent of education for the four-school secondary system. A resident of Richmond Hill Mr. Wilson is the separate school representative on the 13 member board.

"Already Bayview High School is making academic history," said Mr. R. H. Wallace, M.A., assistant superintendent of secondary education for Ontario, during the first commencement of Bayview High School, at which he was the guest speaker on Friday evening.

In a relatively brief address Mr. Wallace outlined the impact of the new federally-sponsored five year courses in "Arts and Science," "Commerce" and "Engineering," which are to be inaugurated next September and then went on to praise and speak to the students being honoured at the commencement. His masterful and scholarly analysis of the philosophies of life and learning were inspirational.

It was an evening of lavish and well-earned praise. Over a hundred awards and prizes bore eloquent testimony to the ability of the students. The work of the students and staff was lauded by the guest speaker, Mr. R. H. Wallace, by Vice-Chairman J. Wilson and finally again by Mr. Howard Eubank, B.A., B. Paed., principal of the school, who

particularly praised the contributions of Mr. Lars Thompson, head of the English Department and Mrs. B. Wallbanks, senior secretary. From the students' point of view, the highlight of the ceremonies was a speech made by William Newton-Smith of last year's Grade 12 and the winner of both the highest and most numerous honours. Like the principal, he outlined the early history of Bayview and with a sincerity that gripped the audience and brought tears to some eyes, paid touching tribute to the efforts and inspira-

tion of Principal Howard Eubank. Commencement activities ended on an informal note when honoured guests, staff, students and audience gathered in the cafeteria for refreshments arranged by Mr. D. Kelly and served by student home economics Club under the tutelage of Mrs. J. Walcroft. Here, both the prize-winning students and the Bayview Glee club formed under the guidance of Mrs. Helen Dunn received a barrage of enthusiastic congratulations which marked a fitting end to a well-organized occasion.

(Continued from page 1) It was strictly uneconomical to be using such a park in the centre of the town on very valuable land. The facilities should be taken nearer to the centre of residential population and certainly should occupy lower-priced land.

A "questions and answers" period followed the presentation of the report, with all those present at the meeting, including a number of members of the public who were present, being given a chance to ask questions and make comments by Chairman Scrimger. During that session and during his report Professor Potvin constantly referred to the Don Mills development, almost suggesting that Richmond Hill could better it. The town had a definite advertising advantage, with over 25,000 people a day passing through it. This feature would add to the selling impact on desirable firms. "Over the next twenty years you're going to have to redevelop whether you like it or not," the planner asserted.

Workers Live Outside
Importance of providing the needed type of accommodation in Richmond Hill was stressed by Mayor Haggart. In his visits to industries, which were being carried out as part of a continuing program, he had found that the majority of workers in

industries were not living in Richmond Hill.

A distinct contradiction within the Department of Highways was pointed out when the planner said that it seemed to put blame on the town for lack of action in widening Yonge Street and that officials had pointed out that there was a limitation to the amount of control which could be exercised through stop lights. That brought an instant response from town council members and others, who pointed out that only a few weeks ago the department was urging the installation of stop lights, declaring it to be vitally necessary in the control of traffic. Professor Potvin agreed to make his information available to town council.

Report Highly Detailed
The 41-page report, with an appendix of another sixteen pages, included an exhaustive report of Richmond Hill's progress over the long period since settlement started in 1794. It traced development of the community through its various phases, dwelling particularly on the "explosion" period from 1953 to the present time.

The report will now go to the town's new planning director, who will study it in detail and make recommendations as to the next step to the town planning board.
