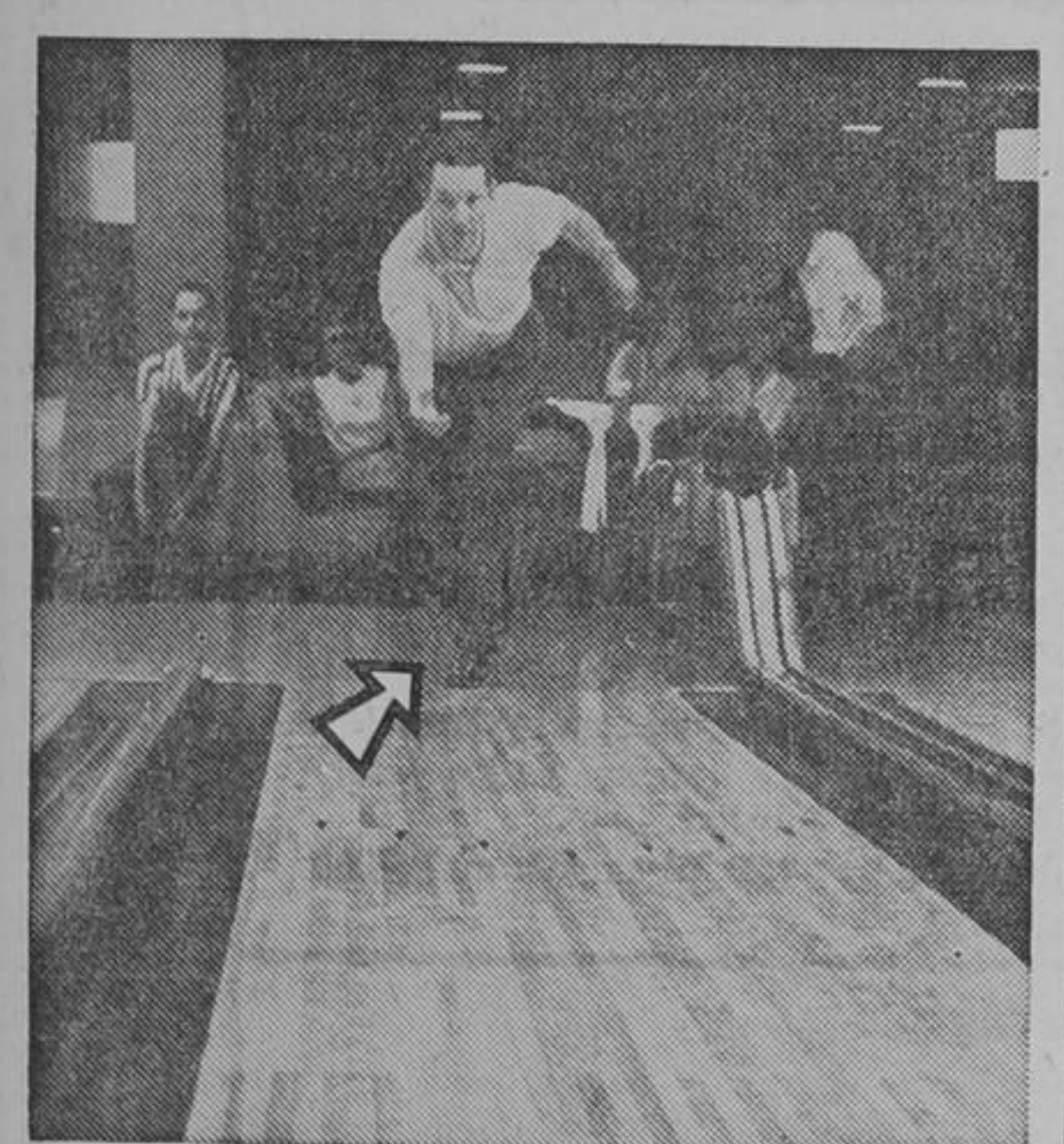
Peoples Church

Winter Works Program Helps

Extension Of Fire Hall Will Be Completed Soon
Trustees
Contracts for work being done on the fire hall extension were discussed at the November 14 King City Village Trustees' meeting at the hall.
Chairman Ronald Bolton expected the completed extension would cost "close to \$12,000".
Mr. F. B. Lutes is responsible for the "shell" of the addition, the masonry, carpentry and roofing work. Mr. Harry Noakes is in charge of the plumbing and heating, and Mr. William Farren, the septic tank and tile bed installation.
Started nearly a month ago, the addition is expected to be finished before the end of the year. Under the federal winter works program, subsidy applies on labor costs.
The 2,000 square-foot section, extending east and south of the original fire hall, will contain boiler room, kitchen, general office, washrooms, garage and storage space.
Hot water heating is to be installed on the west side of the new part and trustees expect the older part of the building will eventually have new heating.
When the extension is ready, the present meeting room trustees and staff have been sharing with the firemen will be available as a recreation room for the brigade.
Vote On Hydro
Prior to the vote on whether the village should purchase the hydro distribution system, trustees decided to mail bulletins to ratepayers.
Mr. Bolton pointed out the rural rate, affecting King City residents, is now the highest in Ontario. He predicted villagers could expect a few cents' reduction, up to a dollar, on their first billing with every prospect of lowered rates in the future if the village own its system.
Mr. Thompson said 810 electors in the village were eligible to vote on the money-by-law.
Suggestions were made about Christmas decorations. If a central site is not available for a lighted tree, the front of the fire hall could be suitably decorated, trustees agreed. Trustee Don Findlay felt the village should lead the way in decorating. Arrangements were left in the hands of Secretary-Manager G. T. Thompson.
The secretary reported "60 or 70" lights destroyed on the last tree installed two years ago. "That seems to be par for municipalities," commented Trustee Findlay.
Reporting on roads, Trustee Robert O'Reilly drew attention to complaints about car mufflers getting caught at a drain-

age ditch on the west side of North Keele St. near the track since the road has had surface treatment. He suggested the trouble spot be corrected before the village was liable for damages.
Mr. O'Reilly and Mr. Thompson would inspect the site.
Trustee Findlay presented a fire report dated from November 1, 1960, to the end of October, 1961.
Brigade at 33 Fires
Mr. Findlay noted 10 fires had taken place in the village and 23 in the township area. Total remuneration for fire watch, training and fire officers' honorarium was \$2,755. "This keeps us safely within our budget," Trustee Findlay reported. The list of fires showed six had been in cars, in and out of town.
The progress of legal preliminaries to changing the status of the park was postponed. Chairman Bolton felt there was "no particular rush".
Trustees decided to ask township council not to give final approval to assumption of roads in Valentine Acres until the subdivision had established that required mains had been installed at the ends of three roads.
A supplemental assessment covering half the year was reported \$41,100. Trustees had estimated \$201 levy from this source and the actual taxes turned out to be \$222.
Trustees sounded pleased with the invitation of a "Salute to King City" on CKVR, November 23, and instructed the secretary to supply requested information for the TV program.
