

The early flowering bubs must all be planted by this time . . . the crocus . . . hyacinth . . . daffodil and tulip. They have entered their long sleep. The hardy plants of forest, woodland and field, when their seed is matured, disappear entirely, not a stem or a dead leaf is left to hint where the star-flower . . . spring beauty . . . violet or Solomon's Seal might be. November counts almost no flowers under her

cold grey skies and upon her bare hills unless perhaps a few hardy plants linger such as the wild aster or a weazened spray of golden rod. Like any wise mother, loving Nature folds away her flower children before the night of winter has well begun.
