Radiation Group Will Be Trained In Local Course

As part of York County's preparations for survival in case of a nuclear attack, a radiation monitoring course is to be held in a Richmond Hill. It will commence on January 17th, 1962, and will occupy two hours every Wednesday evening thereafter for eleven nights. It will be conducted by a resident of Richmond Hill who is fully qualified to give instruction - Mr. V. H. Munro. He is the radiological officer of the Metropolitan Toronto Emergency Measures Organization.

The maximum number taking the course at any one time is 30. Those wishing to enroll may do so by getting into touch with Emergency Measures Organization headquarters at Newmarket - TW. 5-8081. They can also leave their names at the "Liberal" office - TU. 4-1105 or AV. 5-3316 - and they will be forwarded to the proper authorities. There is no fee for the course. Those taking it are given protection under the Workman's Compensation Act in case of accident, also without cost.

At the end of the course those who wish to do so may become members of the County Radiological Service.
