Judging from the number of appearances Santa put in at all the various church and school parties the week before Christmas, it is a wonder he had the strength to struggle down all those chimneys on Christmas Eve.

When he put in his appearance at the Thornhill Lions Club Annual Christmas Party on December 18th, however, he was in fine fettle (not to say figure) and passed out a heart-warming bundle of presents to the 85 or so youngsters who were waiting for him in the Sunday School auditorium of the Thornhill United Church.

While they waited for Santa the children were regaled with a feast of hot dogs, ice cream and cookies. To aid in the digestion of all these goodies, they engaged in some riotous games, and some hearty carol singing accompanied by Mr. Eilert Sand on his violin.

Some 40 Lions took part in the festivities or beamed from the sidelines like a bunch of benevolent uncles, although I noticed that they pretty well slunk away when the games organizers Ed and Ede Butlin got the youngsters into a series of humba chains. It was interesting to see that the girls really enjoyed this and kept their lines intact right to the very end (with one little five year old clinging to the end of a line for dear life through it all, not even letting go to rescue her paper hat when it floated away) while the boys' lines collapsed like a heap of cards every time they were reformed and they used it as an excuse for some marvellous spills.

The party was for youngsters from 6 to 14 and as well as giving a present to each youngster present, Santa also had a present for other children in each family who were unable to be present.

Santa also had presents for two of the Lions' guests at the party. Miss Elizabeth Phelan and Miss Ruby Purdon of the York County Health Unit. These good ladies had provided the Lions with not only the names of the families who needed assistance but with a list of the age and sex of each child in each of the families so that appropriate gifts could be chosen and no one forgotten. Some of the children were from homes where the breadwinner was incapacitated, and one little girl had two brothers with cystic fibrosis, the drugs for one of whom cost \$100 per month, but most were from homes where a big family and a small income would mean a pretty slim Christmas without the help of the Lions.

The two ladies who had done all this preliminary work were no strangers to many of the children who chatted gaily with them and proudly showed their presents. As well as a wrapped present, each youngster received a well filled net stocking and a pair of six year old twins insisted on showing the ladies the contents of their stockings, as they turned out more and more bright treasures.

As in any group of youngsters, there were all types represented, thin ones and fat ones, tall and short, noisy and quiet ones (although mostly noisy it seemed to this reporter). And representing

two extremes were two youngsters, one a thin faced, big eyed little girl of six or seven who held tightly to her present and stocking without opening either, determined to save it until Christmas morning (having learned early, I guess, about the joys of anticipation); and one brash boy of eight or nine who, entrusted with parcels for apparently four or five other members of his family, calmly proceeded to open them all, tossing wrappings and name tags aside with gay abandon. There must have been a riot when he got home.

And after it was all over, the kindly Lions stood patiently, each among his own particular group of charges, while hats and mitts, boots and scarves were sorted out amid stifled cries of "That's my stocking," and "He's got my hat!" Finally, however, the youngsters were shepherded into the waiting cars, and away they all went, stuffed to the gills and ready for bed.
