## 1961 Was Busy Year In King City

With the launching of another year, a brief backward glance at events around King City in the past year show the busy pace set by a community of some 40 organizations. While increase in the number of new houses was slight, population increased by an estimated 200 to the 1,800 mark. It is a year since an organizational meeting in Eva L. Dennis School heard Ontario Safety Officer Louis Hodgson recommend a Safety Council that would function through the village's present clubs. Within a few weeks, King City and District Safety Council became an active force, sponsoring several safety demonstrations throughout the year.

Last January a record turnout argued the pros and cons of establishing kindergarten training under School Section 2 Board direction. Financing was given as the main reason for not altering the existing setup of a private kindergarten.
