Markham Holdup Sees Three Get Stiff Sentence

A conviction on a charge of armed robbery, following a December 28th attack on 70-year-old Cyril Greenland of Grandview Avenue, Markham, Ontario, and his housekeeper, Jennifer Jones, 60, saw two Toronto men and a Richvale young man sentenced to five years in penitentiary by Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake at Richmond Hill court on January 11th.

Found guilty were Richard Davidson, 23, Dovercourt Road, Toronto; Thomas Davidson, 21, Logan Avenue, Toronto; Allan Kinsella, 20, Richvale.

Greenland and his housekeeper were threatened at gunpoint and bound with electrical wiring while the three men made off with \$2,900 worth of jewelry, rifles, ammunition and liquor. They were later arrested in Toronto.

Two Brigades Needed For Carrville Blaze

A woman with a broken leg had to be carried to safety by a fireman when an 80-year-old brick house at 460 Carrville Road at Richvale was heavily damaged by fire on the afternoon of January 10th.

Firemen from the Richvale and Maple brigades fought the blaze for several hours in near-zero weather before they were able to bring it under control.

The fire was said to have started when efforts were being made to thaw frozen pipes. The old residence was occupied by two families, the Nolans and Daddiges. No injuries were sustained. The fire was confined to the upper floor, with extensive water and smoke damage being caused to ground floor rooms.

The old building was the former home of Richmond Hill residents, among them being Mrs. L. Clement.

Reeve's Suggestion Brings Fast Action

Markham To Study P.U.C.

As forecast in Reeve Wilfred Dean's inaugural address recently, Markham Township Council will consider the advisability of setting up a public utilities commission for the municipality.

At its meeting this week, council approved the formation of a fact-finding committee headed by it was Reeve Dean.

Deputy Reeve Lawson Mumberson and Councillor Charles Hoover. They are to report back to township council by June 30th.

The committee will study the relationship of such a commission to the operation of water, hydro and sewage disposal facilities. While the latter does not normally fall into a public utilities commission pattern,

council decided to study it in that connection because of the fact that the service is intertwined with the operation of Metro sewers, the township now paying Metro for disposal service and, in turn, collecting from residents. Thus, it was claimed, disposal becomes a "service for sale" proposition.
